BRITISH WOMEN HAVE LARGEST FEET OF ALL

INTERNATIONAL STATISTICS PROVE INTERESTING.

France and Brazil Are Tied For First Place With Average of Fours.

AVERAGE SIZE OF WOMEN'S SHOES IN SIX COUNTRIES.

- France (Paris) 4.
- Brazil (Rio Janeiro) 4.
- United States (Chicago, Atlanta, and San Francisco) 4 1-2.
- Germany (Berlin) 4 1-2.
- Argentina (Buenos Aires) 4 1-2.
- Great Britain (London) 5 1-2.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14—The greatest of international foot races—the size of women's shoes—is a dead heat for France and Brazil.

Statistics gathered by the United Press Via cable regarding the size of

women's shoes sold in various countries revealed that French and Brazilian girls have the smallest feet, size 4. The United States, Germany and Argentina are tied for third place with 4 1-2, while Great Britain is almost an also ran with 5 1-2.

Chicago, San Francisco and Atlanta, picked to represent the United States, were shown in a similar symposium recently to have the smallest feet in this country.

While a different system of measurement prevails in most countries, competent dealers were obtained to translate all sizes into the American standards.

Following are the reports from various countries:

Paris Likes Plain Fours.
PARIS, Nov. 14—Sales of women's shoes in Paris range from 3 to 5 1-2 in size, but the average, according to dealers, is 4. The widths vary from C to E. Only plain blacks or tans are worn for street wear, while the color for evening wear varies with the gown.

Brazil Flat and Wide.
RIO JANEIRO, Nov. 14—The average size of women's shoes in Brazil is

3 1-2 to 4 1-2 with most sales at 4. The average width is E. Brazilian women's feet are short, plump and highly arched. The most popular style is a compromise between the French and military heel. Bronze is the favorite color.

Berlin Likes Four & Half
BERLIN, Nov. 14—The average Berlin woman wears a shoe corresponding in size to an American 4 1-2. Many 4's and 5's are sold, however. The average width is D. The popular style is a lace boot with cream or colored, giving the feet the appearance of being shorter and narrower than they really are.

The Also Rans
LONDON, Nov. 14—The present generation of British women has generally been crippled by badly fitting shoes and lack of graduated sizes, according to several prominent shoe dealers. As a result the size of the average woman's foot in London is 5 1-2.

"Present day English children are better and more carefully sh.d," said one, "and when they are grown up their feet will be as small and graceful as any in the world."

The American symposium showed the present most popular style in this country is a high laced brown boot with a military heel.

WANT A LITTLE NIP?

Distillers in Kentucky Selling On Several Million Gallons.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 14—Citizens of the entire county and country are hastening here to-day to witness the phenomenon of "whiskey on sale openly without any attempt at stealth or camouflage. Two of the biggest distillers here are permitted by Federal Judge Evans to dispose of their stock. Genuine Bourbon, hundred proof, is selling at seventy dollars a case. The crowd is steadily increasing. Several million gallons are on hand, enough to irrigate the surrounding country for miles. If Judge Evans decision is overruled the distillers are subject to prosecution.

BLUEFISH RUNNING.

Enormous Catches Being Reported Along the Coast.

Enormous catches of blue fish are being reported from all fishing markets along the East Coast and the fish dealers are reaping a harvest as this fish is very much sought after, especially in the eastern markets.

According to old timers about every nine years there are abnormally high tides. At this time the blue fish come in in droves and flocks and gangs. According to the Palm Beach Post one boat captured 10,000 pounds in two hours near the breakers there.
