Slayer of a Priest Gets Life Sentence

Redwood City, Cal., Oct. 13.—William A. Hightower was found guilty today of first degree murder with recommendation of life imprisonment by the jury in the case in which he was charged with the murder of Father Patrick E. Heslin, of Colma, Cal. A motion for an appeal will be filed Saturday when it is expected sentence will be pronounced. Hightower took his conviction calmly saying to lawyers and newspaper men "well, boys, I guess you won't see me for some time." Father Heslin was enticed from his parish the night of August 2 "to administer last rites to a dying man." His body was found several days later badly mistreated after Hightower had led newspaper men to the scene. He had previously tried to obtain rewards offered for the missing priest. He claimed that he had learned of the body being buried in the beach sands through an outcast woman.
