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RESTRICTIONS—BUT NOT TOO MUCH.

In the Southern Christian Advocate, Prof. D. D. Wallace, of Wofford College, has an informing article about the new immigration law restricting the number of newcomers from any country in one year to three per cent. of the number already here from the nation in question, saying that it is grounded on "no principle" and that it could hardly be worse in operation than it is.

Quoting tests of drafted men made by military authorities during the war, he says:

"The United States army made such tests of large numbers of drafted men during the recent war. The proposition of each class that succeeded in passing with a grade of A or B was as follows: Of those born in England, 19.7 per cent.; Scotland, 13; Holland 10.7; Canada, 10.5; Germany 8.3; Denmark, 5.4; Ireland, 4.1; Russia, 2.7; Greece, 2.1; Italy, 8; Poland, 5."

"Englishmen and Scotsmen," Mr. Wallace proceeds, "who come to this country do so upon their own initiative." They are informed about the country and are not of the "beaten men of beaten races" who have failed in their own lands and have readily accepted the promise of steamship agents of something better somewhere else.

Where immigration is organized by steamship companies and great corporations for the purpose of securing passage money or cheap labor it draws the dregs." Mr. Wallace seems to hold that the gates of the United States should be closed to strangers seeking homes within its borders unless they can pass somewhat rigid tests and prove the possession of excellent qualifications.

While The News is inclined to believe that the day has come when immigration ought to be restricted to a degree, it doubts the wisdom of going so far as Mr. Wallace advises. The old notion that the United States is and should be a haven for the distressed and oppressed of all the nations will have to be abandoned—indeed, it has not had in a long time literal acceptance—but we have room for new people. It will not be possible to take choice of the people of foreign countries and Florida, for example, could accommodate, to her own advantage, a few hundred thousand immigrants from almost any of the European races.

The United States has suffered in recent years not so much from immigrants as from the improper distribution of them. The foreign born of the United States would present

no serious problem were they scattered throughout its territory.

Everything will be sent to the Jacksonville grounds not later than November 8.

If we all get together on the exhibit now and either say, come and get my corn, or grasses, or baled hay, or straw, or that will have certain vegetables ready for the exhibit on the first, if we send for them, or will bring them to Palatka—the demonstration agent will know just what is to be done. The exhibit is for Putnam county and if, through it, many more farmers are attracted here, the benefit to the present landowners will be hard to estimate. Then it is a matter of pride for every resident of Putnam county to have our exhibits lead the state. We can prove that they do, if quantity, quality and variety are arranged for, NOW.
