Emperor Charles Refused Parole; May Be Banished

Vienna, Oct. 25.—Emperor Charles and his wife were still interned today in the castle of Esterhazy at Tatatovaros, according to Austrian official advices.

The members of Charles' cabinet, and other prisoners, have been removed to the military prison in Budapest. Besides the members of the cabinet there are being held as prisoners a large number of royalist officers and prominent legitimists, including Prince Ludwig Windisch-Graetz. It is reported that documents of the utmost importance and a quantity of jewelry has been taken from the prisoners.

Charles is being treated with the utmost consideration but has been refused release on parole. In diplomatic quarters it is said that Empress Zita is not considered as being under detention and that she is free to go where she desires. The belief was expressed today that a Hungarian castle will be placed at her disposal and her children sent for, pending a decision as to the fate of Charles.

REMAINS OF JOHN W. DAVIS INTERRED AT ST. AUGUSTINE

Special to the News. St. Augustine, Oct. 25.—The funeral of Hon. John W. Davis, who died at a local hospital Sunday morning, occurred here this morning. The Masons were in charge of the grave service and Rev. L. Fitz James Hendry conducted the service at the home. Mr. Davis has been in failing health for the past four years, suffering from the effects of injuries received in a motor accident in the North Carolina mountains. This past summer Mr. and Mrs. Davis spent some time in Hendersonville, N. C., hoping the change would prove beneficial, but the altitude proved too high and he grew worse instead of better, so was brought back to St. Augustine. Several weeks ago he was taken to the hospital for treatment, and some little time since it was felt that the case was hopeless.

PUTNAM'S EXHIBIT AT STATE FAIR TO BE SPLENDID ONE

The Florida State Fair to be held at Jacksonville November 12-19 will have a good display of Putnam county products if one may judge the interest being manifested in the forermost being manifested by the farmers of the county.

Miss Floressa Sipprell, county home demonstrator, states that she has learned from the directors of the exhibits of the State Fair that all exhibitors are permitted to compete for the prizes shown throughout the State Fair premium list, provided the county exhibit has one display for the county and one for the grower.

As an example, under class 2, lot 10, the competition is for ten ears small eared prolific corn, any variety. Under this lot, if only ten ears were on display it would be scored for the county exhibit, and not for the individual grower. If there were two lots of ten ears each, and provided both lots were grown by the same farmer, one lot would be scored for the county booth and one for the grower.

In this connection Miss Sipprell calls attention to class 21 for meat products. Fourteen prizes, for a total of \$80, with several firsts of \$10 each, will be awarded to the best exhibit of home cured hams, best ham from Florida raised hog, best exhibit of home cured bacon, single strip of bacon, best exhibit pickled pork, five pounds lard from Florida pork and varied exhibit of home cured products of Florida pork. Miss Sipprell is under the impression that there will be little competition, but from what she could learn Putnam need have no fear if the competition were wide.

Unless the farmers raising hay, the various grasses, and also pecans start arrangements immediately to get in varieties and supplies for the exhibit, it does not seem that Putnam county will be able to do as well in this line as should be done.

Besides the products mentioned, Miss Sipprell is trying to work up as good a display and as great a variety as possible of the following: corn, cane, sorghum, cotton, peanuts, baled hay, baled straw, grasses, millet, rice, all mealst oats, legumes, Irish potatoes, cassava as well as cassava root and starch, tobacco, all kinds of fruits and apary products.

The best display of bees, bee products, implements, ect., exhibited by an individual will be awarded a \$20 prize by the Fair association. The vegetables particularly desired, although all kinds are wanted, are all varieties onions, cabbage, cauliflower, pumpkin, squash, beets, turnips, rutabagas, artichokes, celery, rhubarb, parsnips, eggplant, all kinds of beans, peas, okra, peppers, kohlrabi, spinach, dasheens.

The products to be exhibited at the State Fair must be in Palatka at the Mann-Hodge Seed company, all assembled and ready to ship to Jacksonville, before November 8.

Putnam county is well able to make a very creditable showing and there will be no occasion for disappointment if the farmers will only send in the articles desired. Where it is possible to get sufficient quantities and variety there will be further credit coming to the farmer through the prizes that he will win and all awards will be promptly distributed. If interest continues to grow as it has in the last week or ten days Miss Sipprell is hopeful that the Putnam
