A mass of routine matters was disposed of at last night's regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, the principal topic being that of good roads for the county.

Keen interest was also manifested in the discussion of the necessity for keeping primed for making the capital removal fight one that is commensurate with Palatka's superior advantages for location of the state's legislative and executive seat.

Secretary Hart, reporting for Chairman F. J. Fearnside, who was detained by illness, on the progress made by the road committee said the present labors of the committee are being devoted to securing data and information on the most needed road projects, the cost of their construction and the per centage increase, if any, in taxes.

Wonders Why Palatka Sleeps H. M. deMontmolin said that he had hoped George Hilty would be present as he could tell of the interest that Miami and other south Florida cities feel in Palatka's splendid start some months ago toward capital removal.

Chairman John Tilghman, of the merchant's committee reported that a movement is now on foot to organize a retail merchant's association here to embrace all of the retailers of Palatka.

Chairman Goode Guerry reported the plans now under way for post card week and on the recent trip to Jacksonville, which was the idea of Secretary Hart.

Secretary Hart outlined his plan for forming a Farmer's Cooperative Association in connection with the Chamber of Commerce and the State Marketing Bureau. It was heartily endorsed and Mr. Hart said he hopes to present some tangible results of such an organization at the next meeting.

Secretary Hart also read the plan for a Booster's club, which was also heartily endorsed, and will be made a feature of the next month. This is a unique plan for encouraging the boosting spirit in Palatka.

Chairman DeMontmolin, of the transportation committee reported that Palatka can be thanked for the ship-by water movement which Sanford and Orlando have inaugurated and which has resulted in the doubling of river commerce in the last few weeks.

COACH KLINE PUTS THREE 'GATORS ON HIS ALL-SOUTHERN

Special to the News Gainesville, Fla., Nov. 29—Special Harlan, Ga. Tech, left end Roberts, Centre left tackle Whelchel, Georgia left guard Wisky, Florida center C. Perry, Florida right guard Duncan, Florida right tackle Reynolds, Georgia right end McMillin, Center, quarterback, capt. Hale, Miss. College, left halfback Barron, Ga. Tech right halfback Phillips, Erskine fullback

In picking this mythical eleven, Coach William G. Kline of the University of Florida has used great impartiality having selected the men for their consistent work coupled with their ability throughout the season.

Coach Kline said tonight concerning his selection of the mythical All-Southern football eleven, "In selecting this All-Southern team I have seen most of the eleven play but in one or two instances have made the selections upon reputation.

It is a pretty close selection in my mind between Wisky and "Bum" Day of Georgia. I pick Wisky because of his ability to size up plays instantly and his ability to stop line bucks and forward passes equally well. He is a very accurate passer from the center position and also a player of the cleanest type. I pick Carl Perry of Florida for one guard because he is in a class by himself, especially on the defensive end of the game. He is exceptionally fast for his size, weighing 230 pounds. Perry plays a roving center with great ability. Whelchel at the other guard is almost as good as Perry.

"Red" Roberts of Centre is the superman of football and could have just as well been selected for an end position as tackle. At the other tackle I have selected Duncan, of Florida. Duncan is a 200 pound man and over six feet. He has a world of speed and in my opinion, is also the best end in the South.

He is way above the ordinary as a halfback, too. At the end positions on my All-Southern will be found Reynolds of Georgia and Harlan of Georgia Tech and this pair should prove to be a great combination although "Judy" Harlan is a backfield man. His versatile ability assures him of a place on this team.

"Bo" McMillin of Centre is my selection for the quarterback and to him I also bestow the honor of captain because of his superb generalship, his wonderful ability to carry the ball as well as running interference and his great work as defensive fullback.

Phillips, of Erskine, is my selection at the position of fullback. He has been playing behind one of the smallest college teams in the South and has outplayed every opponent, having beaten one or two teams almost single handed.

At left halfback I have picked "Geat" Hale of Mississippi college as in my opinion he is by far the best broken field runner in the South and one of the best in the entire country not even excepting the great "Bo" McMillin.

At the other back position, that of right halfback, I have picked Red Barron of Georgia Tech, because of his terrific driving power, speed and high defensive ability.

Undoubtedly there are men at Vanderbilt, Sewanee and Tulane who are about as good as some of those selected on my mythical eleven but they have not stood out in the games consistently.

The above eleven is not only a great scoring machine but presents one of the best all-around defensive teams that could possibly be selected.

East Coast Will Spend a Million in Shop Extension

Practically \$1,000,000 will be spent in enlarging the Florida East Coast railroad shops and yards at New Smyrna, this decision having been reached by the trustees of the Florida East Coast railroad, following their recent visit in New Smyrna, when on the tour of inspection over the Florida East Coast railway as far south as Cuba.

Regarding this big development work, which will mean a great deal to the town of New Smyrna, the New Smyrna News of Friday last says: "As an aftermath of the visit of the Flagler System officials here, representatives of the Florida East Coast railroad, arrived here Tuesday night to close up all pending deals for the purchase of the property on which the new yards and shops are to be located and it was announced Wednesday that these deals have all been closed, and the only action yet to be taken is the passing by the city commission of an ordinance closing certain streets shown on the city plat as crossing the railroad tracks in the extreme southwest portion of the city, these streets having never been used as thoroughfares. This action will be taken in the near future by the city commission.

"It is given out that the changes and improvements contemplated here will require the expenditure of more than \$1,000,000. "It is said that the appropriation of the necessary money to finance the changes and improvements here has been made, and the only question now in the minds of the officials is whether the work here should be started at once, or whether it should be postponed until after the busy winter tourist season is over. It is necessary that the yards and facilities here will be torn up and blocked while the improvements are being made and it is considered likely this work will not be started until after the tourist season is over. Nothing definite on this subject was given out while the officials were here."

Louis Jacques Balsan, formerly the Duchess of Marlborough and Consuelo Vanderbilt of New York, is in the market. During the war, Sunderland House was commandeered by the office of work and all the famous art treasures were removed. Until quite recently it was the London home of the League of Nations.
