

RELATIVES OF MRS. RIDGLEY BELIEVE SHE WAS ROBBED

Administrator Named to Investigate Supposed Fortune She Left

Chicago, June 13—Appointment of an administrator of the estate of Ora Belle Downs Ridgley was planned today by relatives of the Assumption, Ill., widow in their investigation of circumstances surrounding her death at Hot Springs, Ark., June 6, and search for alleged missing \$100,000 fortune.

Asserting belief that Mrs. Ridgley did not die a natural death, and that the fortune she is believed to have possessed has disappeared, attorneys for the relatives indicated they would ask for an official investigation.

Names of several Chicagoans have been brought into the investigation which has extended to Florida, Texas, Arkansas and other points in the south where Mrs. Ridgley travelled shortly before her death.

Mrs. Alice Horne, a companion who was with Mrs. Ridgley when she died, said Mrs. Ridgley died virtually penniless.

Mrs. Horne said Mrs. Ridgley had become estranged from her relatives and although she expressed a desire to be buried at Assumption, she did not want the coffin opened to permit relatives to see her body. A few pieces of jewelry and other mementos of small value, Mrs. Horne said, were left in her care to dispose of.

At her hotel here, Mrs. Horne exhibited a number of bills, including some from physicians and an undertaker which she said she paid.

BAMBINO'S RIVALS ENLARGING LEAD FOR HOME DRIVES

New York, June 13.—Babe Ruth's home-run rivals have forged still further ahead of the Yankee slugger as the result of a simultaneous skirmish yesterday. Kan Williams, of the St. Louis Browns, who has been in a woeful slump for several weeks, cracked out his fifteenth circuit drive; Rogers Hornsby, his National league townsman, drove out his fourteenth, and Bing Miller, of the Athletics, collected his thirteenth.

The Cardinals went on a swatting rampage against three Philadelphia twirlers and tied their own major league record of ten consecutive hits in a single inning. Trailing the Phillies, 6 to 3, in the sixth, the westers opened a barrage against Meadows and Winters that brought seven runs across the plate. Fournier began and ended the hitting streak in this inning with a single. Altogether, the Cards gathered 23 hits, five by Lavan and four each by Hornsby and Jack Smith. The score was 14 to 8.

Williams' clout with one on in the first inning gave St. Louis enough runs to check the Yankees' winning streak, although the Browns continued to pummel Joe Bush and made the count 7 to 1, while their college recruit, Pruett, had the New York bats silent. Three pitchers were easy for Cleveland, who won, 11-3, the Tigers' four-run rally in the ninth fell one short and Washington strengthened its hold on third place by winning, 7-6, while Chicago took an uphill game from Boston, 7-6, after Schupp's wildness handed the Red Sox an early lead.

Irish Meusel's triple and homer, his sixth, helped the Giants to their third straight over the Reds, 9 to 3, while Aldridge held Brooklyn to five hits and the Cubs turned the tables on the Dodgers, 8 to 0. Frank Mille rhung up his fifth straight for the Braves, who profited by Pirate misplays and won easily, 11-2.

MINORITY REPORT OF LABOR BOARD ON WAGE AWARD

Will Have Three Days in Which to Make New Move

Chicago, June 13—The division in the personnel of the railroad labor board, which resulted in vigorous dissenting opinions on the wage reductions totalling \$110,000,000, effective July 1, already announced, will make its appearance again when another \$40,000,000 or so is lopped off the pay checks of 350,000 more railway men this week.

The majority decision of the board was completed yesterday, but a minority opinion will delay announcement of the new order for several days, it was learned today. Under the board's rules, any dissenting member is allowed three days to draw up his opinion. The new decision will affect all remaining classes of railway employees, except telegraphers, for whom the board will make a separate decision later, and the train service men, whose wages were not before the board for adjustment.

FIVE DAYS IN JAIL. Richmond, Va., June 13—Denied a pardon by Gov. E. Lee Trinkle, Frank Stuart, a member of the Alexandria, Va., bar, who recently figured prominently in connection with divorces in Virginia today will begin serving a five day sentence in jail for contempt of court.

MCCORMICK TO REMAIN ABROAD FOR SOME MONTHS. London, June 13—Owing to his nervous condition following his recent serious illness in New York, John McCormick, on the advice of his London physician and Charles Wagner, his manager, has decided to postpone for at least six weeks his American tour which was to have begun in New York October 8. McCormick is now at his country home in Stow-on-the-Wold.

EXPORT TRADE DECLINES. Washington, June 13.—American export trade suffered another decline during May, dropping from a total of \$381,000,000 reported for April to \$308,000,000. Imports increased in May to \$254,000,000 compared with \$217,000,000 for April.


