"Here's an advertisement for a wife."



CHAIRMAN PHILIPS WANTS ROAD NO. 3 FIRST COMPLETED

But Has Wrong Idea of Present Condition of Highway

The DeLand News publishes a story related by Editor Clayton Codrington, who was present in Tallahassee when the state road depart-ment opened bids for the north end of the Volusia county road connecting with Putnam county's Crescent City road. In this Mr. Codrington quotes Chairman Philips, of the state high-way department as saying that Road No. 3 is in fine condition with the exception of that portion in Volusia county. Mr. Philips is mistaken, as there are several stretches between the Volusia county line and Jackson-ville that in need of repair. Follow-ing is the article from the DeLand News:

At Tallahassee on Wednesday four bids were submitted to the state road department for the 19-mile stretch of road between De Leon Springs and the Volusia county line. The lowest bidder was Evert P. Maule of Ojus, Florida, whose bid was \$1.04 a square yard on approximately 179,520 square yards of crushed stone base six inches deep. J. F. Morgan Paving com-pany of Birmingham bid \$1.04 on this part of the road while the Barber Fortin company of Gainesville bid \$1.09 on this part. The Baunna Construction company bid only on this part at \$1.09 a square yard.

On the next item 168,960 square yards of bituminous macadam sur-face, penetration method, 2 1/2 inches in depth compacted, Maule bid 76 cents a square yard, Morgan bid \$1.08 or with slag as a material \$1.05, while Barber-Fortin bid \$1.09 for stone or slag.

On the other specification of 442,400 gallons of bituminous material Maule bid 15 cents; Morgan 15 cents and Barber-Fortin 16 cents a gallon. All of the bidders promised to com-mence work within 30 days and to complete the contract within 365 days.

How It Stands.

The committee from Volusia con-sisting of Mr. Earl W. Brown and the editor of the News reached Tallahassee in time to be present when the bids were opened and after this had been attended to a long consultation was had with Judge Philips, chair-man of the board, who was the only member of the board present at the time. Judge Philips stated emphati-cally that he was for the completion of state road number three which runs from Jacksonville to Orlando and is in good shape with the excep-tion of the 19-mile stretch in North Volusia county. Judge Philips stated that the board would meet about the first of July at which time the state engineers would have all the bids tabulated and when the contracts would be let. At this same meeting Judge Philips stated he wished to let a contract for a 10-mile stretch in Nassau county on the Jacksonville-Brunswick road which will also be a part of the state road number three. Judge Philips left no doubt in the committee's minds that he was heart-ily in favor of all north and south roads in the state but he mentioned the fact that he was but one of five on the board. He stated however that he would use every effort to have the contracts let for the Volusia and Nassau county projects of state road number three at the July meeting and that in the case of the Volusia 19-mile stretch that contract would be let for six inch base at once, on which the county has agreed to pay \$8,333.33 a mile, and that the bitumi-nous macadam surface would be let just as soon as tax money becomes available in the fall.

As the matter now stands the quarterly meeting of the board in July will be the important date when the contracts should be let. A great deal of importance is attached to the appointment of a successor to W. W. Clark, member of the board who died a few days ago. This appointment should be made within the next few days.
