Three Dead From Jax Auto Crash Saturday Night

(By Associated Press) Jacksonville, July 24.—The death toll as a result of Saturday night's automobile accident, when a car plunged into a crowd of pedestrians on Enterprise street, near McDuff avenue, was increased to three yesterday when Mitchell Weeks, 25, of Enterprise street, one of the victims, died of his injuries in Dr. Marvin Smith's sanitarium on St. Johns avenue.

Weeks died at 3 a. m., just one hour after Charles Strawder Austin, 42, of Enterprise street, passed away. Austin's 21-month-old daughter, Hazel, was almost instantly killed in the crash.

Austin's wife, Elizabeth Austin, 42, and Verdie Lucille Austin, the 10-year-old daughter, also hurt in the crash, are now out of danger and will recover, physicians said last night.

There was no attempt by a mob to lynch Louis P. Cannon, 39, 756 West Monroe street, the driver of the car, Saturday night or during yesterday, the police said, although at first fears were expressed for his safety.

GIANTS HAVE A 3-POINT LEAD ON THE NATIONALS

(By Associated Press) New York, July 24.—After losing the lead to the St. Louis Cardinals for a day, the Giants were back on top in the National league today by a margin of three points in the percentage column, although the west-erners were a half game ahead in the won and lost column.

Bill Ryan twirled his second victory of the series and gave the Giants the odd game out of five with Cincinnati, 4 to 1; St. Louis lost to Boston by the same score after making it four straight from the Braves, closing a home stand in which Ricker's men won, 11 and 6. Tomorrow the two pennant rivals begin a series at the Polo Grounds.

St. Louis outbatted Detroit, but seven errors, including three by the usually brilliant Sleser, cost the Browns an 11-6 defeat. Their league lead was cut to a game and a half, as the Yankees had the best of a comedy of hits and errors with Boston, 11-7. Ruth and Meusel went hitless, but the rest of the New Yorkers were in a hitting mood.

The Yankees, on their way west to open a series tomorrow at St. Louis, are strengthened for the invasion by which the acquisition of Third Baseman Joe Dugan and Outfielder Elmer Smith from Boston in exchange for Outfielder Elmer Miller, Infielders Fewster and Mitchell and a pitcher to be named later.

The eight putouts by Harry Hooper and a total of 15 in the outfield marked Chicago's 10-6 victory over Cleveland, the second straight reserve for the Indians after they had won twelve in a row. Washington pounded three Philadelphia pitchers and won, 11 to 2. Aldridge held Brooklyn to five hits and the Cubs triumphed, 4 to 1.

Chats With You Gas Man

We want you to limit the amount of gas you use to your engine. Here are a few ways to do it: If you are boiling water, do not heat a quart when a pint is enough. When the water comes to a boiling point and you wish to keep there, it is not necessary to leave the gas on full to do so. Turn down. Water violently agitated with a tremendous heat under only escaping in the form of steam. "A watched pot never boils," they say, because in watching it remove the cover and part of the heat escapes. Keep the cover on when it is possible and have covers fit properly. Always light the gas after, not before, you have placed the burner over the burner. Also turn out the gas before, not after, taking the utensil off the range. In the course of a year, this little rule of self will well repay your care.
