No Such Thing as "Shell Shock" Say British Experts

(By Associated Press) London, Sept. 4.—If Great Britain should have the misfortune to be engaged in another big war, it is safe to predict that no cases of "shell shock" will appear among her list of casualties. The first recommendation of the war office committee on shell shock, whose report has just been published, is that the term should be cut out of the official language.

"War neurosis" is considered to be the best general term. "Shell shock" is declared to be wholly misleading, because it occurred to patients who had never been even within hearing of a shellburst.

"It is no surprise to find that the general lay conception of the term was very loose and ill informed, the committee states. "There was such anxious solitude during the war as to the incapacitated, and such was the appeal of the term "shell shock" that this class of case excited more general interest and sympathy than any other, so that it became a most desirable complaint from which to suffer.

"No case of psycho-neurosis, or of mental breakdown, even when attributed to a shell explosion, should be classified as a battle casualty any more than sickness or disease.

"In many cases," say the committee, "it is extremely difficult to distinguish cowardice from neurosis, since in both fear is the chief causal factor."

Colonel Stubbs, D.S.O., expressed the opinion that efforts should be made to get rid of the idea especially prevalent among young soldiers, that it was disgraceful to feel scared when in action.

"I do not know, but I think I was in an awful funk the whole time," he told the committee, "and I think most people were. If the young soldier were given to understand that everybody is very much afraid and that it is a natural condition to be in, but he should overcome it, and if he were told also about the effect of shells and that it was up to him to control himself, I think it would have some effect."

Only a brave man will voluntarily acknowledge that he was very much frightened during the war.

New Varieties of Fruits Developed by Florida Growers

(By Associated Press) Miami, Fla., Sept. 4.—Two Florida horticulturists, one a Chinese and the other a negro, have developed new varieties of fruits which the former believes is destined to fill a gap in the fruit calendar of this section, and the other to introduce a new variety of grapefruit.

Leu Gim Gong, the Chinese, whose estate near DeLand is one of the show places of central Florida, gained international prominence some years ago when he disclosed the development of a new variety of orange possessing unusual qualities, from the viewpoint of the citrus fruit grower. The orange, which was named the "Leu Gim Gong" in honor of its developer, now is produced throughout the state. In March, 1921, Leu Gim Gong announced the production of, and exhibited, a grapefruit remarkable for the penetrating power of its agreeable aroma. His experiments with citrus fruits are continuing.

Hezekiah Brooks, negro gardener and fruit grower of Miami, recently announced the successful conclusion of his attempts to produce a new variety of mango. The result is destined to fill a gap in the fruit calendar of this section because, he claims, the fruit ripens between November

Prohibition Issue Is No Longer Live in Minnesota Race

(By Associated Press) St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 4.—The wet and dry issue has been dropped in the congressional contests thus far in Minnesota for the November election, because of an absence of wet candidates.

All incumbents, including Andrew J. Volstead, have been renominated on the republican ticket and all are avowedly dry. In no case where a close race is expected between republican and democratic nominees was the issue raised.

The republican nominees are: First district, Sydney Anderson; second district, Frank Clague; third district, Charles B. Davis; fourth district, Oscar E. Keller; fifth district, Andrew J. Volstead; eighth district, Oscar J. Larson; ninth district, Halvor Steenerson; tenth district, Thomas H. Schall.

The sharpest conflict is expected in the seventh district where the Rev. O. J. Kvale, democrat of Benson, probably will oppose Congressman Volstead. Both are dry. In the third district, Mrs. Lillian Cox Gault is a democratic candidate to oppose Charles R. Davis, republican nominee. Mrs. Gault also is dry.

There are democratic candidates in only three other districts and they have not announced a position on the wet and dry issue.

MAYOR MARTIN THREATENED BY MAN WHO HIT AUTO

Jacksonville, Sept. 4.—An automobile crank held in Mayor John W. Martin's right hand late yesterday on the St. Augustine road probably thwarted an attempt to do the mayor bodily harm after an enraged automobilist crashed into the rear of Mr. Martin's automobile.

Threatening and abusive language was used by the driver of the car that plunged into the executive's machine a few miles out of South Jacksonville, while the mayor and Mrs. Martin were en route to the city from Mandarin.

Efforts to apprehend the driver were made last night, both by the city and county authorities. Mayor Martin declared he would prosecute the driver if caught. A warrant for his arrest will be sworn out today.

No one was injured in the crash, although the mayor's car was damaged and the front of the other machine was slightly broken. Mrs. Martin and the mayor were shaken up by the impact.
