KLEPTOMANIAC ADA.

A Little Colored Girl Who Makes Away With Other People's Things. Ada Cross, a small colored girl, has developed a remarkable faculty for getting away with property belonging to other people. She is an old offender, having been sentenced to six months in jail some time ago for a similar offense.

In the Police Court this morning, Ada was charged with three different larcenies, to two of which she pleaded guilty; to the third, not guilty. The proof was conclusive, and it pointed to others who received and were charged with receiving stolen property.

The mother denied absolutely having anything to do with receiving the fruits of her daughter's pilferings, but a little judicious questioning of the defendant by the Court elicited more damaging information against Mrs. Cross. Judge Miller, in the interest of the community, is very anxious to break up this thieving and particularly to bring to justice those who instigate the crimes and receive the benefits, as it is evident that these young thieves are acting, if not under instructions, in the interests of their relations. Rebecca Cross, an older sister, was also arraigned for receiving stolen property.

Some of the stolen property was found in the house of Rebecca, who, on the stand, testified that she bought the stuff for her sister, but the Court entertained no doubt of her guilt and sent her to jail for six months.

George McDonald was also on trial for receiving a pair of opera glasses and a gold watch, which he knew were stolen. He is the lover of Rebecca and was evidently as deeply implicated in the matter as any one else and was given six months in jail for each offense by Judge Miller.

The Court was undecided as to what sentence to impose on the little girl, because she was undoubtedly under evil influences, and the Judge would have preferred to send her to the Reform School until she became of age. It was impossible to do this, so she was given eighteen months in jail.

A Runaway Surrenders Himself. William Dunn, one of the three men who escaped from the workhouse Sunday night, walked into the First Precinct Station-House last night and gave himself up. He stated that since the escape he had been in hiding on Twentieth street northwest, and was fearful of leaving his haven of refuge because of the activity of the police who were searching for him. Dunn was returned to the workhouse this morning, where he will serve out his sentence.

No traces of the two men who escaped with him have been discovered.

JIM WHITNEY GOES HOME.

He is Unwilling to Sign for the Salary Offered Him. Pitcher Jim Whitney went home on Monday. He shipped his household effects last week and so far he has adhered to his published determination not to sign with Washington for less money than he was paid last year.

President Hewitt said, when questioned by a Circuit reporter, that he could not give Whitney more than he was allowed in the official classification.

The breach between the president and the pitcher has widened until it amounts to a chasm.

They met on the street on Monday and neither one spoke as he passed by. "I have but little to say to or of Mr. Whitney," said Mr. Hewitt. "All I want to say to him is to ask him whether he wants to sign or not, and all I want him to say to me is 'yes or no.'"

Mr. Hewitt also thinks the Washington team can get along very well without Whitney. "We have plenty of pitchers," he says. So Whitney has either to sign at the listed price with Washington or stop playing ball.

He couldn't play next year, either, if he refused to play with Washington, because Mr. Hewitt declared this morning that he would reserve him for next year, too. This gives Whitney the alternative of going out of the ball business entirely if he doesn't want to sign with Washington and as one buys his release, His announced intention is to go into business in Boston. He said the other day that he couldn't live on \$2,500 a year.
