THE WORKHOUSE MATTER.

Intendant Stouenburgh Exonerated by the Investigation. The Washington Asylum investigation was concluded last afternoon, and Intendant Stouenburgh exonerated from all the charges. Mr. Wheatley submitted his report to the Commissioners and it was signed by them. The report takes up the charges one by one, and disposes of them in the light of the testimony given.

Regarding the first charge that old material belonging to the District had been sold and no returns made, Mr. Wheatley says that while it is regretted that no account was kept, it had been proven by Commissioner Webb's testimony that no account had been given to do this, and that the second charge which was that the matron was addicted to drink and negligent of duty was not sustained. Her physician filed an affidavit in the morning, owing to physical causes she was obliged to use opiates.

The report says in regard to the fifth charge that there is considerable conflict of testimony about the food furnished. The principal objection, however, appears to be in regard to the quantity of food, and it is quite possible that a more rigid inspection on the part of the Inspector and more careful supervision by the Intendant would be productive of improvement.

The report goes on to summarize the result of the investigation, beginning with a statement of the character of Mr. McGuigan, saying that "the testimony is conclusive as to his unavailability, want of veracity and evident malice." An examination of the records kept by the Intendants showed that the accounts were kept in a systematic manner, showing in detail the business transactions of the institution.

"This examination of records," concludes Mr. Wheatley, "taken in connection with some facts as to general good management appearing from the testimony, confirms me in the belief that the testimony is conclusive as to his unavailability, want of veracity and evident malice." An examination of the records kept by the Intendants showed that the accounts were kept in a systematic manner, showing in detail the business transactions of the institution.

The Commissioners approved the report with the following recommendation: "Commissioner Wheatley, to whom was referred the charges preferred by McGuigan against the Intendant and matron of the Washington Asylum for neglect of duty, having made report thereof, after due consideration by the board, it is ordered that the charges be dismissed, and that the Intendant be reinstated in his office, with the order of the board with regard to the sale of property be strictly enforced."

Another Murder. Mortimer Riley Mortally Injured on Sunday Night. Last Sunday evening a colored man named Mortimer Riley, 73 years old, left his home at 277 1/2 Street, between L, M and N and Third and Fourth streets, to go to church. As he was crossing the canal on the M Street Bridge he noticed that three men were following him. He stopped at the house of a friend, and waited for some time, in order to avoid his pursuers. He then returned to his home, and he started back for home. Just after he passed the corner of First street he met the three men, and before he could speak he received a violent blow in the face and his coat was pulled over his head, one of the men exclaiming, in response to his exclamations, "We are night doctors."
