The Academy of the Visitation at Georgetown will graduate Miss Mary Waggaman of this city, Miss Agnes McQuade of Utes, N. Y., and Miss Susie Lanahan of Pittsburg, Pa., at its commencement next Wednesday afternoon.

John O. Cantwell is constantly compelling his brother to make a tour of the pawn shops to recover his property. Recently it was his Knights of Golden Eagle recalla; now it is a clock and a banjo. His brother has had him arrested.

A negro named Frank Dickson had a quarrel with Willis Campbell in Davis' saloon, at the corner of New Jersey avenue and N street northwest. Campbell fired at Dickson, the ball striking a twenty-five-cent piece in his vest pocket. This feat saved his life. Campbell made his escape.

Mrs. Sarah Courtright had been drinking considerably when she came to the wharves at the foot of Thirty-first street, Georgetown, and with entire unconcern she walked into the water. She was taken out and taken back to her house in Brick Hill. She was not seriously injured.

Mrs. William D. Rudy, the bride of a year of the well-known member of the Columbia Athletic Club, who died yesterday, was this morning taken to her home in Bloomington, Ill. Funeral services at her residence, at 1227 O street, before the body was taken to the train.

Thomas Sims has been untrue to his wife, Laura, his new chamber being Mary Jones. Laura discovered unmistakable proof of Thomas and Mary's perfidy last night, and precipitated a small riot then and there. They were locked up in the Eight Precinct Station House.

Laura Dade had an eventful evening yesterday. She was arrested by Officer Kendig on H street, near Ninth, for fighting with George Wells. On being placed in a cell with Eliza Brown she challenged her to a hand-to-hand contest, beating her with a shoe until the state-keeper intervened. Then she sat down in moody sorrow and grief, because there were no more worlds to conquer. Her melancholy led her to attempt suicide and she threw herself up to the cell door, but she was cut down by attendants and was put in handcuffs.

Reduced Rates For Herd's Hides. The new schedule which the Herd's company has borrowed from the railroad of selling commutation books has met with the approval of a large number of regular customers of the company. The commutation book places each ride at three and seven-tenths cents, and the book, being transferable to all members of the family, the investment is found to be one of appreciable economy. Department employees living in the northwest section of the city find the arrangement especially convenient for their purposes. Washington is somewhat deficient in arrangements for local transit, but this is at least a step toward improvement.

Our Area of Cultivated Land. Some interesting statements regarding the extension of the area of cultivated land in the United States are presented in the May report of the statistician of the Department of Agriculture. It appears that the area under the four principal staple crops—corn, wheat, oats and cotton—increased from 325,000,000 acres in 1870 to 390,000,000 acres in 1888. This represents an expansion in nine years of the area under these crops of 65,000,000 acres, or an extent of land more than equaling the entire area of the three Northern New England States. The increase in the area under corn, oats and cotton is greater than the total area of the State of Ohio. This startling result leads the statistician to make the further calculation that if the increase in all tillable and grass land has been in the same proportion as that in the four crops mentioned, we have now a total area of improved lands in farms of 350,000,000 acres, as compared with 283,000,000 acres in 1870, or an increase almost equal to the total surface area of New England, New York and New Jersey, equaling the entire area of improved land in 1870 in the eleven cotton States, with the addition of Delaware and Maryland. The figures of the coming census dealing with the agricultural area should present some interesting comparisons with those of the last census year.—[Brad street's.]

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AGGIE WATSON'S DEATH.

Frederick Barber's Case Being Argued in General Term. The case of Frederick Barber, the colored man charged with having murdered his mistress, Aggie Watson, by throwing her into the canal in Georgetown, was placed under argument to-day in the Court in General Term. Barber was convicted in the Criminal Court, but an appeal was taken, objection being made that the indictment was defective. It alleged that the woman was mortally drowned, and that the defendant did kill and murder her. The defense claims that the allegation is not sufficient, but that it should be specifically alleged that death resulted from the drowning. It is also claimed that the woman was drunk and fell off the bridge, instead of being pushed off.
