AN INTERESTING CONTEST. A Race Arranged Between Kearney and Smithson. Some friends of Kearney of the Potomacs were talking with Bob Holtzman yesterday, and as a result of the conversation the latter offered to give a handsome medal to be worn by Kearney and Smithson. Kearney's friends acknowledged that Smithson could beat him in a mile and a half single scull race, but held that Kearney was the faster man at a half-mile dash. Smithson's friends were equally confident that he was a faster man from the first stroke. Neither man has yet been seen, but as they are both confident of their own abilities, it is highly probable that they will come together. A half-mile course in front of Bob Holtzman would enable a great many people to witness the race and prove an attractive afternoon's entertainment.

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A SUDDEN CALL. Officer Gorman of the Police Force Found Dead in His Bed. Private John J. Gorman of the Police Department was found dead in bed at his residence, 210 Massachusetts avenue, at 5:30 this morning. He had been a victim of apoplexy and heart disease for years. He was one of the oldest and most respected members of the force, and for five years past he has been detailed as a clerk in the Property Clerk's office at Headquarters. He was appointed on the force January 31, 1857, and was 50 years of age. He was a native of Cork, Ireland, and previous to his appointment on the police force he was a lieutenant in the volunteer service of the navy. His brother, Michael Gorman, was equally devoted to the force and a clerk in the Detective office. Mr. Gorman leaves five motherless children. Mrs. Gorman died only a few weeks ago.
