Report of the Quartermaster-General—The Manning Canal.

GENERAL AND PERSONAL.

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A FREE BRIDGE.

The Alexandria Canal Company Will Transfer the Canal to the Government.

The necessary action of the stockholders of the Alexandria Canal Company to secure the transfer of the Aqueduct bridge to the Government was taken at a meeting held in Alexandria yesterday.

At this meeting 4,286 of the 6,800 shares of stock were represented. Solicitor McCue appeared as the representative of the Government's stock.

By a unanimous vote the contract entered into between the Alexandria Canal, Railroad and Bridge Company and the Government, which was made on the 18th of October, was ratified.

This contract provides that both companies unite in a deed of the bridge and its approaches to the Government. The purchase price, \$125,000, to be paid to the Alexandria Company, which will pay outstanding judgments against the Canal Company.

The lease held by the former will be canceled and the Canal Company will regain possession of all the property it has leased.

The directors were required to see that the deed was executed, and after the meeting they examined the papers and prepared to take the necessary steps to carry out the contract.
