THE EVIDENCE thus far taken by the Congressional Immigration Committee makes it very plain, though no doubt existed in regard to it before, that there has been for some years a systematic importation of foreign labor—of men wholly ignorant of the country, or of its social or political institutions, but who were willing to work in coal mines and elsewhere at wages on which the average American would be unable to subsist with any degree of comfort or decency. It is this system more than any other which has brought to our shores an element of population not to be desired, and in direct competition with the native workman. It has encouraged the influx of classes who are out of place in a free Government, little above the beasts of the field in intelligence and altogether unable to assimilate with either our own people or those of foreign birth who come to this country in good faith to become useful and permanent citizens. The evil has been dealt with to some extent but not with the vigorous effectiveness that it requires. The importation of contract labor must cease. Not only the workmen of the United States but the general public demand it with reason and justice, and the whole power of the Government should be called into requisition, if necessary, to enforce its inhibitory legislation.

GENERAL A. P. HOVEY, Member of Congress from the First Indiana district, has captured the gubernatorial nomination, which, under all the circumstances, is a great honor. Several of the ablest men in the State had been named for the head of the ticket. Albert G. Porter was the favorite, but declined to accept the candidacy in such terms as to force the withdrawal of his name. Then the stampede went to Hovey with an irresistible impetus, and the choice is undoubtedly a good one. General Hovey is a veteran of high standing, and will be depended on to divide the Democratic soldier vote. He is a hero of two wars, having been a Lieutenant in the war with Mexico, besides coming out of the late unpleasantness with a Major-General's brevet. He is now serving his first term in Congress.
