STATE OF GOVERNMENT.—The *Planters' Gazette*—We were highly amused at the manner the *Argonaut* correspondent of the above paper, and the factious editor took notice of us in their last number. If they do not understand the secret of our enjoying good health in Plaquemine and all other unhealthy places, (for we will inform the gentleman that we have lived in various climates, in the new and old world) we will let the old proverb "laugh and grow fat," and their articles, so much excited our risibilities, as to increase two pounds to the three stone, we have gained since we left that village and located in Baton Rouge, where we breathe a pure atmosphere, all the year round. The hotel H. speaks of, we had the pleasure to board at in 1840, and though it has been enlarged since, it was in existence a long while previous, even before it was an hotel. We like Plaquemine and its environs; we have passed happy moments there, but we have in our night, by one slide, seen it deprived of at least 130 feet in depth of its front, and we sorry to see it crumbling, especially on the bayou side, year after year. Our solicitude for the seat of Government is to place it where it will be out of danger of being washed away, and not through any evil intentions towards Plaquemine. It says if Baton Rouge is a healthy place, why do the U. S. troops leave it during the summer months? We answer that no such steps were ever taken by any other administration but that of John Tyler, and for what reason we, nor the officers themselves, could ever explain. The only persons who have ever lived in Baton Rouge, and who, to our recollection, call it unhealthy, are those who have had the good luck of having their limbs bound with rags, and live at the state's expense. We believe in the will of the majority, and whatever place the wisdom of our legislators may designate for it, will be satisfactory to us; though, in our opinion, Baton Rouge possesses advantages over any other town in the state. Most of the trade of St. Mary and St. Landry comes through the Atchafalaya, and not through bayou Plaquemine, as the editor of the *Planters' Gazette* would lead people to believe, and consequently passengers need no re-embarkation to land in our town.

THE MARKET.
Wednesday morning, Dec. 3.
COTTON.—The market opened on Saturday last with a fair demand with very full prices; opening at 20 1/2 cents per lb. for the full bale, and 20 1/2 cents for the short bale. On Monday 3000 bales changed hands at very full prices, but before the market closed, holders asked an advance, which was resisted by purchasers. To-day the transactions amounted to 2,500 at 21 1/2 cents. Holders appear determined to advance their pretensions, and when we left the market a decided upward tendency was perceptible. The sales of the last three days amount to 10,800 bales.

SUGAR.—The market continues quiet steady at our former quotations. 200 hds only were sold since our last. We quote now from 4 1/2 to 6 cents per lb. for extreme qualities, but a very choice article might bring 6 1/2. There have been no transactions on Plantation since our last.

MOLASSES.—The weather also interfered with this market, and molasses is dull at 21 1/2.

FLOUR.—The sudden impulsion which the market had received by the news brought per Libernias has already subsided, and flour is now at \$1.50 to \$1.65 per barrel lower than on Saturday last. Some flour of Ohio was made to day at \$2.65, but the market closed with a downward tendency.

WESTERN PRODUCE.—We notice no change in any of the articles under this head. Pork is worth \$15.50 a \$16 per barrel. Beef is selling at \$11.00; and of Prine there is still some in market. Bacon moves freely; without any variation in price, we quote shoulder 7 a 7 1/2; Uccanvased 7 1/2 a 7 3/4; Canvased do. and Extra Cured 8 a 10 cents per lb.

WHISKEY.—This article has also suffered a decline, in common with bread stuffs and is now at 27 cents per gallon.

CORN.—Has experienced the same fate as flour and fallen to 70c, at which some 1200 sacks were sold yesterday.—Bee.

The trial of T. M. Wadsworth was commenced on Wednesday last, and the examination was postponed till the next day.

A FORGER.—George Hamilton, whose name has been before the public several times lately, appears to be a regular contributor of other men's names, and determined to live by his wits.
On the 26th Apr. 1841, he was convicted of forgery in the Criminal Court, and sentenced to four years imprisonment at Baton Rouge. Sometime last April the Governor pardoned him, and he returned to the city. A few weeks only elapsed when he was arrested for forging the name of Alexander Moore, clerk of the merchant St. Birds, to a collection bill for \$55.50; and on which he collected that amount. For this he was tried on the 3d of last July, but the jury could not agree upon a verdict; and he was discharged on bail for his future appearance. Not long after this affair, he was again arrested for forging the name of himself, and collecting of Messrs. d'Arquin Brothers, and collecting

the sum of fifteen dollars from the steamer John B. McKim. For this he was again sent before the Criminal Court. The Grand Jury took up the case, and owing to the absence of material witnesses threw the bill out. Yesterday he was about to be discharged, but by the intervention of the judges, when he had and another victim came forward, Mr. William A. Baker appeared in the Criminal Court, and made affidavit that this same George Hamilton had represented himself to him as James Wright, of the late firm of Brander, McKenna & Wright, in the year 1840, and drew a draft for \$250, signing the name "James Wright." This note Mr. Baker had discounted for Hamilton in the State Bank of Louisiana, and had afterwards to pay the amount of it on the discovery of the forgery.
On this latter charge the Attorney General will prefer another indictment. In the meantime Hamilton is lodged in the Parish Prison, to await his trial for this and the other charge not yet disposed of.—Delta

FLORIDA.—The Governor of our young sister State, in his message delivered at Tallahassee, on the 18th ult., recommends to the Legislature a revision of the Judiciary system; the imposition of a capitation tax in the revised of the land tax, for the purpose of raising the revenue; and the revenue of the State at \$25,000, which he deems insufficient for the wants of the Government. He also suggests a tax on law suits, and restraints upon the right of law suits on the Florida coast. He refers to the questions of boundary submitted to the Executive of Georgia and Alabama. He expresses himself the advocate of education. He calls the attention to the Banks. But in speaking on the organization of the militia and the removal of the Nominations, he lays out his chief thoughts on this subject, but they are too long to be given in full. He is less long and tediously prolix. We have presented all its important features.—Tropic.

DAYS WITHOUT NIGHTS AND NIGHTS WITHOUT DAYS.—Dr. Baird is delivering an interesting and instructive discourse on the nature of one of which the *Times* has the following notice:—
"There is nothing that strikes a stranger more forcibly, if he visits Sweden at the season of the year when the days are long, and the nights are short, than the absence of night. He is reminded of the words of the poet, 'The sun does not go down at all. Travellers go up there to see the phenomenon. It only occurs one night. The sun goes down to the horizon, and the whole face of it, and in five minutes it begins to rise. At the North Cape, lat. 72 degrees, the sun does not go down for several weeks. In June, it would be about 35 degrees above the horizon at midnight. The way the people there know it is midnight, they see it rise on the horizon, and the changes in those high latitudes, from summer to winter, are so great, that we can have no conception of them at all.
