Mississippi Democratic State Convention.

The Convention assembled at Jackson on the 4th inst., made the following nominations.

For Governor, John J. Pettus, of Kemper. For Secretary of State, B. R. Webb, of Pontotoc. For Auditor of the Public Accounts, E. R. Burr, of Noxubee.

For State Treasurer, M. D. Haynes, of Yazoo. The following resolutions, reported by a Committee, were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we renounce as the basis of party action, the platform of principles laid down by the Democratic party at the National Convention in 1856; and hold that the doctrine of "non-intervention" with the institution of slavery in the States, Territories or District of Columbia does not nor was it intended to conflict with the assertion of the power of Congress to protect the property of the citizens of the several States, who may choose to settle in the Territories, which are the common property of all the States.

Resolved, That in the language of the Supreme Court of the United States, that "the right of property in slaves is distinctly and expressly affirmed in the Constitution" and "the only power over it conferred upon Congress, is the power coupled with the duty of guarding and protecting the owners in their rights," as thus declared.

Resolved, That Mississippi will stand by her sister slaveholding States in insisting upon "the enforcement, by all the departments of the Federal Government, of their constitutional rights as thus expounded by the Supreme Court of the United States.

Resolved, That in the event of the election of a Black Republican candidate for the Presidency, by the suffrages of one portion of the Union only, to rule the whole United States, upon the avowed purpose of that organization, Mississippi will regard it as a declaration of hostility, and will hold herself in readiness, separately or in concert, to cooperate with her sister States of the South, in whatever measure they may deem necessary for the maintenance of their rights as co-equal members of the confederacy.

Resolved, That we feel it incumbent upon the Democracy of Mississippi again to declare that the acquisition of Cuba by the United States is a commercial and political necessity, and that we will hail with pleasure every proper measure that looks to its accomplishment; and further, we can never consent to its appropriation by any foreign power.

Resolved, That we endorse, in the main, the policy of the present Administration.

On the second day, the following resolution was also adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention do recommend to the various counties of the State to hold primary meetings and select delegates to assemble at the city of Jackson on the second Monday of December, 1859, to constitute a convention of the Democratic party, to select delegates to represent the State of Mississippi in the National Democratic Convention, to assemble in the city of Charleston, South Carolina, in 1860.

At our late Convention the press of the district was in part represented by Dr. Lacy, of the Caddo Gazette, Mr. McCranie, of the Vernon (Jackson Parish) Times, and Mr. Levy, of the Natchitoches Chronicle, who were delegates, and by Mr. Taylor, of the Baton Rouge Advocate who was present as a spectator—four as accomplished Democratic editors as can be found. They are the antipodes of those whom McCranie himself describes in the annexed paragraphs:

The editorial profession, it cannot be denied has long suffered in reputation and caste, as compared to other strictly intellectual professions by the indiscreetness and selfishness of its own members. Like the calling of teachers it has grown into disrepute and is undervalued in public opinion, simply from the up-starts and hair-brained individuals, who have taken to newspapers as a block and tackle to raise themselves into notice, or as a trumpet to sound their own praise on everybody's ears.

Such a disastrous influence has these wielded against the editorial life and so dishonest and corrupt do they show themselves in politics, individual responsibilities and in all the varied relations of public life, that the word editor is regarded as the synonyme of corruption and those who bear the name as sheep in the shambles ready to be knocked off to the highest bidder. This is a melancholy fact known to the profession everywhere. Ignominy and disgrace has been brought upon those who feel and heed "the grip of honor" from association with such debased jackals. Would to God for the name of the profession and the general welfare and healthy vigor of the world of mankind these eyesores could be taken away at the roots.

We mean nothing personal in what we say; but are guided by the dictates of principles alone. We feel as one who is about to retire from old comrades to whom he can bear no malice nor the least ill-feeling; and, hence, speak with the warmth and fervor consequent on a sorrowful leaving-taking. Truth is truth to the end of time, and honesty outshines all the jewels of earth.

ANOTHER GREAT BATTLE.

The steamships Adelaide and Hungarian, brings news which is telegraphed as follows to the Picayune of the 7th and the Delta of the 9th: The Great Battle on the Mincio. Lospos, June 25, Noon.—Despatches from Paris, announce that the Empress Regent, under date of Friday evening, June 24th, that a terrible battle had been fought, and a great victory achieved by the allied army.

The whole Austrian army and nearly the entire force of the allied army were engaged in the conflict.

The entire Austrian army was formed in line of battle and extended five leagues.

The battle lasted from four o'clock in the morning to eight o'clock in the evening of Friday the 24th.

The French took a large number of prisoners, flags and cannon.

About 400,000 men were engaged in the battle. A Vienna despatch says that the battle was still progressing, but details of the engagement had been made known by the Government.

Previous accounts from the seat of war state that the Austrian force on the river Mincio was 280,000 strong, and that the entire French force had passed Monte Chiari—that they made a reconnaissance as far as Gato, and that the Piedmontese army were advancing towards Peschiera.

Threatening Movement of Germany. The Prussian Government had demanded permission of Hanover to march 30,000 troops through that territory to the Rhine.

It was believed that the basis of the proposed mediation of Prussia would not be acceptable to France, and that Prussia would thereby become involved in the war on the side of Austria.

It is also rumored that Prussia has threatened to assist in the suppression of the Hungarian revolutionary movements.

England.

Parliamentary proceedings have been suspended till the members of the new Ministry are re-elected.

It is reported that the new Ministry intend to curtail the navy expenditures.

The weather during the past week has been unfavorable for the growing crops. The general prospects of the harvest, however, are favorable.

The King of Belgium and Count of Flanders have arrived at Buckingham Palace on a visit to Queen Victoria.

Details of the Great Battle.

LONDON, June 25.—The latest reliable despatches from the seat of war left the Austrian headquarters at Villafranca, between the fortresses of Verona and Mantua, with the entire Austrian army concentrating on the left bank of the Mincio, and the Allied army advancing towards the right bank from Castiglione.

Before the Allied army had reached the Mincio in force, the Austrians with the entire force of their army crossed to the right bank, and took the initiative in the fight.

A despatch from Napoleon to the Empress Regent, says: "The enemy withdrew last night. I slept in the room occupied in the morning by the Emperor of Austria."

"Gen. Neill greatly distinguished himself at the battle and has been created Marshal of France."

"The Austrians crossed the Mincio for the purpose of attacking us with their whole force, but were obliged to abandon their positions, and withdrew to the left bank of the river, blowing up the bridge at Goito after them."

"We took thirty pieces of cannon and 7000 prisoners."

Private despatches from the camp, via Turin and Paris, state that the Austrians had 35,000 men placed hors de combat, and lost sixteen flags and seventy-five pieces of artillery.

The great excitement prevailed at Paris upon the announcement of the victory. The Boulevards were immediately thronged with people eager to read the bulletins which were posted up by the Government.

The full official details of the battle have not yet been received, and great anxiety was felt at Paris for a more circumstantial account of the battle.

Private telegrams from the seat of war intimate that the French army have suffered so severely as to be unable to resume the offensive.

Vague rumors were in circulation at Paris, that the loss of the French army was 12,000 killed and wounded.

The battle was fought at Salferino, a small town a few miles from Goito.

According to the latest accounts the Austrians were preparing for another great battle under the command of Field Marshal Hess.

Foreign Markets.

LIVERPOOL, June 29.—Of the 18,000 bales sold during the three days since the sailing of the Adelaide, 3,000 bales were taken by speculators and exporters.

The market closed dull. Holders are offering their stock freely, but show no disposition to press sales.

The quotations of last Friday are barely maintained.

The advices from Manchester continue favorable.

The market closed quiet and dull, but prices were well maintained.

LIVERPOOL, June 29.—The breadstuff market closed very dull and prices have a declining tendency.

Beef closed dull generally at previous prices.

Pork closed dull, and prices are unchanged.

Bacon closed dull. Lard closed heavy, and all quotations have slightly declined.

Naval stores closed steady at previous quotations.

LONDON, June 29.—The London money market is slightly more stringent, but exhibits considerable activity. [Pisanyan.]
