New Orleans Correspondence.

Tecumseh—Achievements of Democratic Administrations—Venality of the Press—Necessity of Union and fraternal harmony—Reckless traders in their country's integrity—Soule—Slidell—Contrast—Senatorship—Louisiana Courier.

This is the anniversary of the battle of the Thames. This day 40 years ago, Col. Richard M. Johnson of Kentucky met Tecumseh, the chief of the Shawnee nation, and slew him in a personal combat. Tecumseh held the rank and received the pay and emoluments of a Brigadier General of the British army, duly commissioned by his Majesty George the Fourth.

A Democratic administration declared war against Great Britain in 1812, and prosecuted it with vigor until Dec. 1814, when a treaty of peace was signed at Ghent; but, before its promulgation, it was rendered more durable by the brilliant victory obtained over the English forces on the plains of Chalacheta, on the 8th of January, 1815.

The Democratic party now controls the Government, and, up to this day, the measures which were indocrinated by its great apostle, Thomas Jefferson, mark the policy of Mr. Buchanan's administration, the history of which, when written, will add another brilliant page commemorative of the worth and purity of our illustrious men.

It is not to be regretted that the venality of the press has been remarkable from the days of Jefferson up to the present time? There has been no difficulty in securing the services of fowl-mouthed hirelings, who, for a consideration, would hurl their barbed arrows of calumny and detraction against the guests and the best men of the country; and this blot on the press must remain unchanged so long as bad men and political hirelings have control of it, and so long as bad and designing men have by accident a position in our party which they may be enabled to distract or perhaps destroy it.

Since that event it has assumed various phases, in which, however, the identity with the original movement has never been lost. Soule, who set that "ball in motion," found himself hopelessly prostrated, deserted by the Democratic party which holds the ascendancy in the State, and gounded to madness by the decadence of his sunshine friends, he hoped that by a lucky movement, which had its commencement about the time when the Hon. S. A. Douglas was the city's honored guest, he might by lucky combinations regain the confidence of the disaffected of the Democratic party, who like himself have hopes of riding into power on the political success of the Little Giant; he also hoped at the same time, that he might be enabled to have the gratification of jeopardizing the political standing of the Hon. John Slidell, whose political fortunes appear, in despite of every thing, to be identified with the downfall of Soule.

Always holding a higher and more exalted position in the Democratic party than Soule, he had been heretofore forced, by treachery and the management of his political enemies, into a secondary position, but his indomitable will and singleness of purpose set at naught the machinations of his enemies. When he was defrauded out of his election to the Senate by the defection of Col. White, a Democratic Senator from the Parish of Plaquemine, and the mean maneuvering of Soule, instead of descending to the political charlatanisms which has recently marked the conduct of Soule, he stood firm and unflinching by his principles, reliant on eventual success. It has been that reliance on principles twice vindicated. The discrimination of the Democratic party, in selecting well tried men for high public positions, has never been more clearly demonstrated than in the case of Mr. Slidell. This Legislature will elect a Senator, Mr. Slidell's term expiring on the 4th March, 1861.

That gentleman is prominently before his party for re-election—the opposition to him, though not broad-cast over the country, has great intensity with the few in the city who have called the feeling into existence. Mr. Clark one of the most intelligent of the leaders, and for political acumen greatly the superior of Soule, being applied to for the peculiar platform of the Old Follows' Hall reformers, replied promptly: "It is the political downfall of John Slidell." It is this feeling which is apparent in the vulgar and continuous assaults on Mr. Slidell in the True Delta newspaper, actuated by the great hate entertained by the senior of that journal towards him. It is the same spirit which has been so ceaseless in its efforts to make the contest for Senatorial, but happily the country press, with but one or two single exceptions, are opposed to it. It is now apparent that the country Democracy can not be forced into an Opposition on sectional grounds, against Mr. Slidell. The controversy may be now regarded as narrowed down to the city. The role of Soule for the Know Nothing ticket and the attempted fraternization at Lyceum Hall between the New Linters and the Samboles for the purpose of forming an Opposition, has been a mortifying failure, and the card of Dr. Cottman which may be looked for in a few days, in which he declares his intention to support the State ticket, is the terminus of all future efforts for an Opposition ticket.

The Louisiana Courier will make its appearance on Sunday next and will take its stand as in the days of Peter K. Wagner, as the expositor and defender of the Democratic party. Every good Democrat will welcome its re-issue; independent journalism is sadly deficient in sustaining the principles of a party, it requires history against cabaret to be properly appreciated. The True Delta will now meet a political foe, that will return blow for blow, it will be done with a hearty good will too, until its security ceases. The Old Linters have a long account to settle with that journal, and it will be liquidated to the last cent on that you may rely.
