SAMUEL GREENLAND.—Letter Rip writes from New Orleans to the B. R. Advocate, Sep. 17th:

Rumor tells us that there is great dissatisfaction in the Know Nothing ranks. I know that it does exist, but it is not so deep seated that the probability of Democratic success for these valuable offices would not heal all differences in the Samboelite ranks and consolidate all their power in preventing what, to them, would be an incalculable evil. Some may think that Parker should not again be a candidate for an office out of which it is supposed that he has cleared \$75,000. There might be a disposition to overlook Joe Hernandez and Tom Askew in the fat offices, to which they have been nominated—the same with Wiltz and Trepanier. But does any one suppose that the Know Nothings would hesitate which to choose between those offices, the incumbents or a Democrat? It is too absurd to speak of. The Democratic party will only nominate for political offices and they are willing to give their hearty aid and cooperation in breaking down Thuggery. If the independents select good men for the various offices, they will be sustained by the Democracy of the city and parish. I am not as sanguine as some, of the success of the movement which is now on hand, but one thing is certain that the footing up of the polls on the 7th of November, will be very different from what has heretofore been the final result.

New Orleans Correspondence.

The K. N. State Ticket—Sketch of T. J. Durant—No Democratic parish ticket in New Orleans—The independent movement—The Hon. Miles Taylor—John Ray called to the scratch—The First Congressional District—A Democrat to be nominated and elected.

New Orleans, September 23rd, '59. The Opposition Ticket agreed upon by the Know Nothings on Monday last, has fallen still-born on the public mind. The card of Mr. Drex, declining the nomination, hardly made its appearance in the public press, before it was followed by a letter from Mr. Durant accepting a nomination for Attorney General from this patch-work Convention.

Mr. Durant has astonished many persons by his acceptance who have no particular acquaintance with him, myself amongst the number. Although not a lovable man he has had the reputation of being a firm yet impracticable Democrat, and although charges have been made against him of abolition proclivities by various respectable citizens and his expressed determination in 1856 not to vote for Mr. Buchanan gave strength to those charges, yet to my mind they only confirmed the impressions I have formed in regard to his impracticability, and even to a *moderately* which disconcerted him politically. He is a man of ability, but exclusive in his personal as well as political relations, haughty and vindictive, with a countenance expressive of a vile temper and uncompromising spirit. By his talents and industry with the aid of the Democratic party, he arose from the ranks, and having filled the responsible and lucrative position of U. S. Attorney, he has amassed quite a fortune, which has been yearly added to his success as a lawyer. Like his friend Sickles he commenced life as a printer, and excelled in that vocation, but early abandoned it for politics and the law. I have heard the Danish island of Santa Cruz and the city of Philadelphia each claimed as his birth place, but it is immaterial which of them is entitled to the honor. He maintains the character of a good citizen and exemplary deportment, in all his social relations. His acceptance of the nomination from a convention composed of the *waters!* of that which met in one of the small rooms of that vast building the city Hall on Monday last must and will continue to be a matter of surprise and astonishment to those who have known him best and longest.

There is much more of importance, which is engaging the attention of the Democratic party of the city at this time, than anything connected with the *pre-bid* ticket. With one accord the Democrats of the city have abandoned all idea of nominating a parish ticket and have determined to give their candid support to the independent movement which is gaining ground rapidly, and is meeting with favor from the most respectable of our citizens irrespective of party. If they present exceptional men for the various offices, New Orleans will be disentangled from the power of Know Nothing Thugs and assassins in November next, and the bloody record of the crimes and wrongs inflicted under its regime upon inoffensive citizens, will be the only thing left of this scandalous organization except the loathing and horror which must be forever etched to the vile perpetrators and their advisers.

By those who profess to be, and are really better informed than I am on the movement, which is now progressing in the city, the most sanguine hopes are entertained of a perfect discontinuance to the Know Nothing party. I am not thoroughly imbued yet with the zeal and confidence which inspires some of my friends, yet I begin to feel its influences. The demonstrations I have seen of the most marked character, and certainly give a promise of all that is expected by the most zealous. There is a life and activity in the party at this time, which has not been observable before for years. The cravings of those who are always active in claiming the best offices in the gift of the Democratic party, have become suddenly and singularly appeased and they are vigorously and sincerely aiding the new movement. With this weight which has broken down the Democratic party for the last five years, taken from its shoulders, the same torrid, mid-air, which in by-gone times was wont to strike terror and dismay to our opponents, will be again seen in the front of the battle not warring alone for the benefit of its adherents but warring against the common enemy to law and order. The identity of the Democratic party will not be lost in the conflict, but its power and the sacrifices which it makes for the public good will be remembered and appreciated by all good men, and its principles will be again more firmly established than they have been for years.

The Hon. Miles Taylor will have to respond categorically to certain interrogatories which will be propounded to him by the Democracy of the 1st and 4th Districts of the city, and the other Democratic parishes in his District in regard to the amount of sympathy he has expended in this opposition movement and indicated by his friend of the True Delta. They will wish to know whether or not, the continuous assault of the organ, on the administration and its friends meets his approbation and endorsement. The question now is whether he will be able to separate himself in sentiment and feeling from his organ the True Delta. If he fails in his reply to satisfy the Democracy also have endorsed Mr. Buchanan and his administration in their State, Parish and Ward conventions, his nomination will be repudiated and their votes will be cast for some man whom they consider more worthy of representing them. That Mr. Taylor is doomed to be disturbed in his quiet position is now evident. He will be made to understand that he is not to give his countenance to those reckless assaults which are daily made in a paper with which public opinion unmistakably identifies him on a Democratic administration and its supporters, and expect the support of its friends in November next. If he indulges in any such delusion, he will find himself, perhaps, mistaken. The time has arrived when it becomes necessary for all candidates for public station to show their hands. They must not be hoisted into power, uncommitted to the *ex crimes*, without whose aid they would be powerless. Democracy demands it, and nothing can satisfy it but a full and frank disclosure of their hands. Without irreverence in the quotation that "Those that are not for us are against us" we trace to the New Testament as authority for one of the oldest and most treasured principles of our creed.

I am glad on Hyams' account that he has John Ray Esq., for an antagonist for the place of Lieut. Governor. He is a tough one and it will take a tough one to stand our wily Saladin. The hoarse-hearted Richard in his crusade against unbelievers, found in the east a foeman worthy of his steel—in John Ray has the process of *Contra de Leon*, he may stand our Saladin a few rounds, but if he fails to come up to that standard, *time will be called on him* (in purgatorial parlance) in a few rounds and the battle will be lost and won.

The Democracy of the 1st Congressional District

have not the slightest intention of permitting that election to go by default. They will have a candidate in the field and expect to elect him handily at that, notwithstanding the new line opposition. Mr. Bienville may draw off a few Democratic voters from the regular candidate, but not sufficient to render the election of the Know Nothing nominee Bouligny certain, nor to endanger the success of the Democratic candidates. We will have a candidate who is a "tower of strength" in himself, and who will excite the enthusiasm of the "oldest inhabitant" between Canal street and the "Balize."
