Baltimore Election.
[TELEGRAPHIC.]
BALTIMORE, Oct. 12.—The election in this city for municipal officers was held to-day, but without a repetition of some of the disgraceful proceedings which have characterized so many previous occasions of the kind.

There was considerable excitement during the day and serious disturbances occurred at several of the polls.

In the ninth ward the reformers were attacked and driven entirely away from the polls at about 3 o'clock this afternoon, and the candidate of the Reform party for that ward withdrew his name in disgust.

In the thirteenth ward a serious collision occurred between the two parties and several were seriously injured.
