

5. All those who would lower the rates on our tariff taxes, the point of no return, and who would abandon the protectionist system of reducing the public revenue whilst increasing the exorbitant profits of a few at the expense of all other industries.

6. All those who would abolish every unjust tax like that which gives banks the people's profits on a national currency; every unequal and indeterminate tax, like that which is most onerous upon the poor—the tax of our irredeemable paper money.
