ALEXANDRIA, La., July 6, 1882. Pursuant to a call of the chairman, the Democratic Conservative Executive Committee of Rapides Parish met this day at the City Hall of Alexandria, La.

Present—Ben. Turner, James Andrews, Jr., L. E. Texada, Jonas Rosenthal, and H. M. Rogers. The Chairman explained the object of the meeting to be determining whether or not there was sufficient time to make nominations for a candidate for the position of an additional Judge of the 12th Judicial District of Louisiana, and to take the necessary steps towards the calling and holding of said Convention.

On motion of L. E. Texada, it was resolved that there be primary elections held by the various precincts of Rapides Parish, on Saturday, the 21st day of July, 1882, at their usual polling places, for the purpose of voting for a candidate of the said party for the office aforesaid, and after said vote is taken the commissioners appointed for that purpose, shall count the same and make due return thereof to this committee, on Monday, the 24th day of July, 1882, and after the said vote is thus received by this committee, it shall compile the same, and the candidate receiving the highest number thereof shall be supported by this committee as the candidate for the aforesaid office, in the Convention to be held as hereinafter designated.

It was further resolved that no person who is not a known Democratic voter, shall be permitted to vote at said primary election. It was further resolved that the Executive Committees of Grant and Avozelles Parishes, be invited to meet this parish in the District Convention at Alexandria, Louisiana, on Tuesday, the 25th day of July, A. D. 1882, and that the Secretary of this committee at once notify them of the same.

Representation in the District Convention will be based upon the vote for L. A. Wiltz in 1879, and will be the same as is allowed in the State convention. Base Ball Meeting. A joint meeting of the Natchitoches Omega and the Alexandria Base Ball Clubs was held at the Town Hall, on Sunday, July 24, 1882, at 9 o'clock p. m.

Mr. George W. Kile was elected Chairman, and Mr. J. T. Sprowl Secretary. Both nine being fully represented. After the Chairman had stated the object of the meeting, it was decided, on motion of Mr. N. Tauzin, that the third game for the championship would be played at Natchitoches, La., on Wednesday, July 26th, 1882, at 4 o'clock p. m., and that the Natchitoches Omega's pay the expenses of the visiting nine, together with the two substitutes, scorer and umpire from the railway station (Provencal) and return, and during their stay in Natchitoches. THE NEW SIAMSE TWINS.—The brothers Tosi, born in Turin in 1877, are considered to be even more curious than the famous Siamese twins. They have two well formed heads, two pairs of arms, and two thoraxes, with all internal organs; but at the level of the sixth rib they coalesce into one body. They have only one abdomen, one umbilicus, one anus, one right and one left leg. Their genital organs consist of a penis and scrotum, and at the back there is a rudimentary male genital organ, from which urine sometimes escapes. It is a curious fact that the right leg moves only under the control of the right twin (named Baptist), while the other is movable only by the left twin (named Jacob). As a result, they are unable to walk. This left foot is deformed, and is an example of talipes equinus. Each infant has a distinct mind personality; one is awake while the other is sleeping. When one is sitting up, the other is in a position almost horizontal. [Press Medicale Belge.

PROCEEDINGS OF CITY COUNCIL. ALEXANDRIA, La., July 5, 1882. Pursuant to adjournment the Board of Aldermen of the City of Alexandria, La., met in the Mayor's office this day at 4 o'clock P. M. There were present: Jas. Andrews, Jr., Mayor, Edmond Weil, N. L. McGinnis, W. O. Dammon, W. W. Whittington, Jr. Absent—Bernhard Mayer.

The minutes of last meeting—June 6th, 1882, were read and approved. The Treasurer's report, showing balance on hand of \$350.11, was approved.

Mr. M. W. Calvit was elected Constable and Mr. Landry Bailiff Night Watchman, both for the term of six months, the Council reserving the right to dismiss one or both of these officers at any time. The following gentleman were appointed a committee to contract for and superintend the repairing of the Town wharf at the head of Beaugard street: Jas. Andrews, Jr., N. L. McGinnis, E. Weil. Messrs. N. L. McGinnis and W. O. Dammon, the committee appointed to take charge and dispose of the lumber used on the levee during the recent flood, handed in their report, showing \$31.85 balance realized from sale of lumber and 11,000 feet remaining on hand. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

On motion the sum of \$37.50 was appropriated to defray the expenses of the Mayor to and from New Orleans—the amount incurred on visit to that City to Col. Robt. S. Day, in interest of our Town. The bill of Mr. Thos. J. Severns, amounting to \$37.00, for laying the floor in Engine House, building oil room, etc., was approved for \$25.00 and the Mayor instructed to issue a warrant.

ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Alexandria, La., in regular session convened, on this 5th day of July, A. D. 1882.—That the herding or grazing of stock of any kind in herds or droves, within the corporate limits, is hereby prohibited from and after this date. For each and every violation of this Ordinance the owner or owners shall be fined in the sum of not less than \$5 or more than \$25 per day for every day, and in default of paying said fine shall be imprisoned in the Town Lock up 24 hours for the first offence, and 48 hours for each subsequent one; and it is hereby made the duty of the Constable to first inform the parties of said Ordinance.
