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The following is the synopsis of the Platform adopted at Chicago, on July Sth:
The Democratic party of the Union, through its representatives in National Convention assembled recognizes that as the nation grows older new issues are born of time and progress, and old issues perish, but the fundamental principles of the Demooracy, approved by the united voice of the people, remain and ever will remain as the best and only security for the continuanee of free government, the preservation of the personal rights of
the States, and the supremacy of the Federal government within the limits of the Constitution will ever form the true basis of our liberties, and can never be surrendered without destroying that balance of rights and powers which enable the continent to develop in peace and social order to be maintained by lo cal self-government. It is indis pensable for the practical applica tion and enforcement of these fun damental principles that the gov ermment should not be controlled by the same political party. A fre quent change of the administration is as necessary as the constant re currence to the popular will; otherwise, abuses grow and the government, instead of being carried on for the general welfare, becomes an instrument for imposing heavy burdens on the many who are governed for the benefit of the few who govern-public servants thus become arbitrary rulers. This is now the condition of the country, and Republicange is demanded. Republican party, so far as principle is concerned, is a reminiscence
in practice. It is an organization for enriching those who control its machinery. The frauds and jobbe ry which have been brought to light in every department of the govern ment are sufficient to have called for reform within the Republican party, yet those in 'authority, made reckless by the long possession of power, have succumbed to its cor rupting influence and have placed in nomination a tioket, against which the independent portion of he party are in open revolt. Therefore, a change is demanded. Such a change was alike necessary in 1876, but the will of the people was then defeated by a fraud which can never be forgotten nor condoned. Again, in 1880, the change demanded by the people was defeated by the lavishness of money contributed by unscrupulons contractors and shameless jobbers, who had bargained for unlawful profits, or for high office.
The Republican party, during its legal, ite stolen and its bought tenures of power has steadily decayed in moral character and political capacity. Its platform promises are now a list of ite past failures. It demands the re toration of our navy; it has squandered hundreds of millions to create a navy
that does not exist. It calls upon Congress to remove the burdens under which American shipping has been depressed; it imposed and has continued those burdens. It proesses the policy of reserving the publlc lands for small holdings by actual settlers-it has given away the people's heritage till now a few railroads and non-resident aliens, individual and corporate, possess a larger area than that of all nur farms between the two seas; it proesses a preference for free institutions; it organized and has tried to legalize a control of the State elections by Federal troops; it professe desire to elevate lahor-it has subjected American workingmen 0 the competition of convict and imported convict labor; it professes gratitude to all who were disabled or died in the war, leaving widow and orphans: it has left to a Demcratic House of Representatives the first effort to equalize both bounties and pensions. It proffers pledge to correct the irregularities of our tariff; it created and has continued them. Its own Tariff Commission confessed the need of ore than 20 per cent. reduction; ts Congress gave a reduction of ess than 2 per cent. It professe the protection of American manuactures; it has subjected them 'to $n$ increasing flood of manufactured goods and a hopeless competition with manufacturing nations, not ne of which taxes raw materials. It professes to protect all Ameri can industries. It has impoverished many to subsidize a few. I has impoverished many to subsidize a few. It professes the proection of American labor-it has depleted the returns of American agriculture, an industry followed y half our people. It professes he equality of all men before the aw-attempting to fix the statgs of colored citizens. The acts of its Congress were overset by the deci sions of its courts. It accepts a new the duty of leading in the work of progress and reform. Its caught criminals are permitted to escape through the contrived delays or actual connivance of the prosecution. Honey-combed with corruption, outbreaking exposures no longer shook its moral sense. Its honest members and its independeut journals no longer maintain a successful contest for authority in its counsels or a veto upon a bad nomination. That a change is necessary is proven by an existing surplus of more than $\$ 100,000,000$, which bas yearly been collected from a suffering people. Unnecessary taxation is unjust taxation. We denonnce the Republican party for having failed to relieve the people from the crushing war taxes which have paralyzed business, erippled industry and deprived labor of employment and of its just reward. The Democracy pledges itself to purify the administration from corruption, to reatore econo my, to revive respect for law, and to reduce taxation to the lowest limit consistent with the due regard the nation to its creditors and pen-
sioners; knowing full well, however, that legislation affecting the occupation of the people should be cantious and conservative in methd, not in advance of public opinion, but responsive to its demands. The Democratic party is pledged revise the tariff in a spirit of fairness to all interests.
The Civil Service.-The various offices of the goverament belong to the people thereof, who rightfully demand to be allowed to erercise and fill the same whenever they are fitted by capacity, integrity and onergy ; the last two qualifications never to he tested by any scholastic examination. We hold that frequent changes of Federal officers are shown to be necessary, first, to counteract the growing aristocratic tendencies to a caste of life offices; second, experience having shown that all investigation is useless while the incumbent and his associates hold therr places. Frequent changes of officers is necessary to the discovery and punishment of frauds, peculations, defalcations and embezzlements of the public
