

A Difference Without a Distinction

—SAYS the New Orleans States: A Mr. Snell, of Baton Rouge, has written a letter to the Republican National Committee, urging that Blaine should be permitted to deliver one or two speeches on the tariff in Louisiana. He says the consequence would be "a tremendous uprising in his behalf." They are not all dead yet. With St. Martin, Houston and Gay as Democratic candidates for the First, Second and Third Congressional Districts, all for the protection principle, Mr. Blaine's advocacy of a high tariff would serve his party very little in Southern Louisiana. In the cotton districts of the State his talk would not have the slightest influence.

—SHOULD neither Cleveland nor Blaine receive a majority of the electors chosen by the people at the coming election, the election for President would devolve upon the House of Representatives and that of Vice-President upon the Senate. In that case Cleveland would be elected President and Logan Vice-President. The House of Representatives would vote by States, as provided by the twelfth amendment of the Constitution of the United States. The Democrats have a majority in each of twenty-one out of the thirty-eight States that constitute the Union—giving them a majority of four. In the Senate the members would vote individually and the Republican majority would be three.—[Exchange.]

—THE Republicans are attempting to obtain voters from all sources and nationalities. A Cleveland, Ohio, Judge has issued naturalization papers to a Chinaman, who will vote allee-samee as the Judge, who is a Republican.

—LOGAN is in a pout because the Republican barns in Ohio have showed him little or no attention or consideration. He says: "If Ohio is carried, it will carry itself. The present style of management won't carry it."
