

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

ALEXANDRIA, LA., Nov. 3, 1884.

The City Council met in regular session this day at 4 o'clock P. M. The following members were present:—

In the absence of the Mayor, (on account of sickness,) Councilman N. L. McGinnis was called to the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved without being read. The Treasurer's report of October 6th was read and approved, and showed a balance due the Treasurer of \$3.77. His report for month of October showed a balance due him of \$42.51.

During the recess of the Board, by the authority of three members thereof, the Mayor was empowered to approve the following accounts, and certificates of indebtedness were issued in payment thereof and made receivable for all dues to the Corporation:

On motion Councilman Rosenthal was appointed a committee of one to inform Mr. O'Connor that he must complete his contract before December 1st, 1884.
