Proceedings of Mass Meeting.

ALEXANDRIA, LA., May 15th, 1886.

At the Mass Meeting of the citizens of Alexandria, La., held this day, to take into consideration the appointing of a committee of gentlemen to act in concert with our representatives in the legislature in the matter of the rebuilding of the Louisiana State Seminary at its former site in this Parish, G. W. Bolton was chosen President, G. A. Staples, D. Kuhnagle, G. O. Watts, B. Turner, I. C. Miller, J. B. Ashley, Julius Levin, N. L. McGinnis, Dr. E. B. Price, Jas. Andrews, J. J. Ferguson, A. Pettengill, A. Heyman, M. Bloom, and John C. Clements, Vice-Presidents, and W. W. Whittington, Jr., Secretary.

Judge W. F. Blackman being called explained the object of the meeting and asked the concurrence and assistance of the people of the Parish, after which it was resolved that a committee be appointed to draft a memorial to be presented to the legislature.

The Chair appointed the following committee, viz: W. F. Blackman, J. G. White, G. O. Watts, B. Turner and M. Ryan.

It was also resolved that a committee of five gentlemen, with five alternates be appointed to go to Baton Rouge to present the memorial to the legislature, when the Chair appointed the following: J. C. Wise, chairman; W. F. Blackman, Jas. Jeffries, J. G. White, E. J. Barrett. Alternates—G. O. Watts, W. W. Whittington, Jr., Jas. Andrews, J. R. Thornton, A. D. Havard.

It was resolved, that the following committee be appointed to collect funds to defray the expenses of the committee while absent: A. Heyman, Julius Levin, B. Turner, I. C. Miller, F. Seip, C. J. Barstow, W. A. Griffin, Jonas Rosenthal, J. R. Thornton.

The meeting then adjourned. G. W. BOLTON, Pres't. W. W. WHITTINGTON, Jr., Sec'y.

At a meeting of the Levee Committee, organized to secure the building of the levee in this Town, held on the 14th inst. the following resolution was passed:

District Court, after a session of two weeks in Grant Parish, adjourned on Friday last. The Chronicle says Judge Blackman is to be congratulated at the celerity with which business was disposed of before him. Twenty-five criminal cases were tried, resulting in nineteen convictions and six acquittals. The grand jury at this term found fourteen true bills, and reported no bills in twelve cases.

We learn that Mr. R. W. Bringhurst, Surveyor of Rapides Parish, and Mr. G. Johnston, surveyor of Grant Parish, have been employed to select 60,000 acres of land lying in the Parishes of Rapides, Grant and Catahoula. This selection is to be made from the lands owned by the railroad, on account of a division of stock among the individuals composing the railroad company. The work of selection has already been commenced by Messrs. Bringhurst and Johnston.—[Coffax Chronicle.]

Important Decision.
