HIS FIRST MASS.

AN INTERESTING CEREMONY AT THE CATHOLIC CHURCH.

It does not often fall to the lot of a country Catholic church to bear during the year, the first masses of two newly ordained priests. As every catholic knows, it is considered a special blessing. Such has been the case in Saint Francis Xavier's church of this town. Last Spring our congregation welcomed Rev. Father Dumas from France, and on Sunday they again welcomed Father Connolly, from New York, who was ordained last Thursday at Natchitoches, by our Bishop Monseigneur Durier.

The decorations were, as usual, very fine, and the choir, under the leadership of Mrs. Williams, rendered the "Convent Mass" in a very impressive style. The new Father has a fine presence, an excellent voice, and he displayed a great deal of self-possession. Our pastor, the Rev. L. Menard, assisted him through the whole mass.

Rev. L. Menard preached the sermon of welcome, taking his text from the epistle of St. Paul to the Hebrews, chap. 5, v. 6, being the words of the psalmist: "Thou art a priest forever, after the order of Melchisedec." In feeling words he welcomed the young priest, as his co-worker in the vineyard of the Lord; and he explained the office of a priest as a sacrificer to the Lord under the new dispensation and as the keeper of the tabernacle, being thereby the dispenser of God's mercies and his representative on earth.

The special election called by the Mayor and City Council to take the sense of the property tax payers on the question of voting a five mill tax for ten years in aid of the Alexandria and Little Rock Railroad, will come off on Saturday next, the 29th. It is the duty of every enterprising property holder, who has at heart his own and the town's future welfare and prosperity, to walk to the polls on that day and deposit his ballot in favor of the ordinance. We see other cities doing it—Shreveport for instance, (and all know how steadily that city is gaining ground)—and let us keep up in the line of march. We have commenced, let us not go backward. Vote the tax—get the bridge across the river here, and our head for a foot ball if we do not, in a very few years, grow to such immense proportions that we will be ahead of many of the now large cities of the South.

A Good Man Gone.

By the death of Dr. C. T. Ratcliffe, which occurred in this town on Saturday morning last, October 22d, at his home, surrounded by his entire family, this community loses one of its best citizens, the medical profession one of its most learned members, and his family one whose loss is irreparable.

Dr. Ratcliffe at the time of his death was in the sixtieth year of his age, having been born January 28th, 1827. He was a native of Fairfax County, Va., and came to Alexandria in January, 1850, and the following year his family arrived, since which time they have constantly resided in our midst.

The deceased was a man of many good traits of character—honest and sincere in his convictions and faithless in his love for the truth and for the esteem of his friends. He was a kind husband, an indulgent father and a friend that could be trusted.

To his grief-stricken wife, and to his broken-hearted children, six in number, four girls and two boys, now almost grown, we extend our sincere sympathy. Let them have courage and consolation in the happy thought that the husband and father has only "gone before."

His remains were interred in the Methodist cemetery, in Pineville, on Saturday afternoon, his funeral being largely attended.

BURNED TO DEATH.—From Mr. W. E. Wilson we learn that the little four year old boy of Mr. James Webb, who resides at Poland, was burned to death on Thursday, the 13th inst. The accident happened in this way: The child's mother had left the little one in the room and had gone for a pail of water; a fire was burning in the fire place, and on the hearth was a can of coal oil. When the mother returned she found the child enwrapped in flames. It is supposed the child was playing with the coal oil and in some way it took fire. The child only lived about thirty minutes; he was badly burned, one eye being entirely put out. This case is a sad one, and should serve as a warning to parents that they cannot be too careful when they leave a child alone in a house where there is fire.

ALEXANDRIA, LA., Sept. 20, 1887.

Pursuant to adjournment the Board of Aldermen met in the City Hall this day, at 11 o'clock a. m., with following members present:

The Mayor stated the object of the meeting, viz: to take final action on the following letter received from Col. B. W. Johnson, of the Little Rock and Alexandria Railroad Company, and a petition of property tax payers, asking that an election be called to take the sense of the property owners on the question of voting a five mill tax for the period of ten years, to the above named Railroad Company:

LETTER. OFFICE OF LITTLE ROCK AND ALEXANDRIA RAILROAD COMPANY, LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Sept. 14, 1887.

THOMAS CRAWLEY, Mayor: DEAR SIR—We have now about perfected all of our arrangements to build our road, and also arranged with President J. D. Beardsley about the use of his bridge charter, and want to go to work at once. If your city proposes to give us the tax that you speak of the sooner it is voted the better. We are going to build the road right along, and if we do not get the assistance promised us, we will cross above. As soon as the tax is voted, and the deed to the thirty acres made, we will be at work on the bridge. Get your Council together at once, and let me know at Camden what you will do. Respectfully yours, B. W. JOHNSON.

PETITION. To the Honorable Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Alexandria:

We, the undersigned being one-third of the property tax-payers of the City of Alexandria, Parish of Rapides, State of Louisiana, do respectfully petition your Honorable body to levy a special tax of five mills upon the taxable property of the City of Alexandria for the period of ten years, which tax when collected from time to time, as the same are annually collected, shall be donated and paid over to the Little Rock and Alexandria Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, the first payment of said tax to be made when the said company, its successors or assigns shall have completed a good and substantial standard gauge railway from the said City of Alexandria to the Northern line of the State of Louisiana, and said road to be finished within two years from the granting of said tax under the said election or by your Honorable body in pursuance of said election:

The following ordinance was presented and read, and on motion of Councilman Sullivan was unanimously adopted—

ORDINANCE.—STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF RAPIDES, CITY OF ALEXANDRIA.

Whereas, a petition in writing signed by more than one-third of the property tax payers of the City of Alexandria, has been presented to the City Council of said city, praying said Council to submit the question of a five mill tax for a period of ten years in aid of the Little Rock and Alexandria Railway Co., its successors or assigns; and

Whereas, the said petition and the said signatures thereon attached have been duly considered by the City Council of said city at a special meeting held on the 20th day of September, 1887; therefore

Be it ordained and enacted by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Alexandria, La.—That in compliance with the prayer of said petition, a special election is ordered to be held in the City of Alexandria, on Saturday, the 29th day of October, 1887, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers of the City of Alexandria the question whether or not a special tax of five mills per annum for ten years, shall be levied upon all the taxable property in said city in aid of the Little Rock and Alexandria Railway Co., its successors or assigns.

Be it further ordained, That said election shall be held under the general election laws of the State now in force, and at the polling place to be designated by the Mayor and Council of said city, and that the form of ballot to be used in said special election shall be—"For Railroad Tax," and "Against Railroad Tax," and

Be it further ordained, That a majority in numbers and in value of the property tax payers of said City of Alexandria shall determine the question herewith submitted, and that the result of the election shall be announced and promulgated by the Mayor and City Council, immediately after the same shall be determined; and

Be it further ordained, That if the result of the election shall be in favor of the levying of said special tax the first levy and collection of said tax shall be made and the first payment thereunder shall be paid to the Little Rock and Alexandria Railway Co., its successors or assigns, whenever the said Company shall have completed and put in operation a good and substantial standard gauge railroad from the City of Alexandria, on Red river, to the Arkansas line; also the construction of a railroad bridge across Red river, connecting Pineville and Alexandria, and to be located within the incorporated limits of the City of Alexandria, and that the expense incurred in the collection of said tax shall be borne by the said Railway Co. Provided, the actual work of constructing said Little Rock and Alexandria Railway shall be commenced on or before the 1st day of April,

1888, and be fully completed and said railroad in operation on or before the 1st day of November, 1889.

Be it further ordained, That the City of Alexandria hereby donates to the above designated Railroad Co. thirty acres of land, adjacent to the city limits where ever practicable, upon the following conditions, to-wit:

1. The said land to be incorporated if not already incorporated at the time of donation.

2. The said Railroad Co. shall construct, build and maintain permanently, its own division terminus, with all the appliances and appurtenances thereto belonging, consisting of machine, repair and workshops, and to be used by said company, its successors or assigns, for no other purpose.

And provided further, that upon the failure of said Railroad Co., its successors or assigns, to comply with the stipulations set forth in this ordinance, the said Railroad Co. shall forfeit the donation of land and all right to said tax, and the voting thereon shall be null and void.

Be it further ordained, That the Mayor be authorized to issue his proclamation designating time and place for holding said election, and also the appointment and qualification of commissioners of election.

On motion the Board adjourned.


