RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY RAPIDES PARISH FARMERS' UNION.

(By T. R. Neal.) Whereas, The Board of School Directors, (nine members concurring), did open public schools for six months in our parish; and, Whereas, the first of May there was no uniformity in the length of time these schools had been taught; and, Whereas, we have not learned that it is customary for three members to attempt to undo the legal enactments of nine, and thereby subvert their will; therefore, be it

Resolved, We are much surprised, and most truly regret the class legislation of a minority of our Board of School Directors as manifested by them on the 6th of last April, in discriminating in favor of the sons and daughters of the citizens of Alexandria, and against our own, and most respectfully ask our Honorable Board of School Directors to see justice done to all in our parish, and specially to see that our children have as many months school as any other class in our parish; and further, to prevent the unanimous work of all the Directors from being countermanded and thwarted by three of them. We furthermore demand, "Equal rights to all and special favor to none."

(By Linn Tanner.) Resolved, That as the State Union called meeting, at Alexandria, did ordain that each Parish Union in the State should elect a committee of three to solicit donations and subscriptions for the buying or building a cotton bagging factory, to be located at some point hereinafter to be selected by the State Union meeting; therefore, be it

Resolved, That such an election take place immediately. This resulted in the election of Linn Tanner, J. H. Ellis and W. W. Monroe. (By F. H. Seals.) Be it Resolved by the Parish Union, that each subordinate Union be requested to open a mark and brand book, in which the marks and brands of stock of the membership shall be entered by the Secretary. This book to be kept by the Secretary for the use of the members, and to be open for investigation at any time.

2nd. That for each mark and brand entered therein the party having mark and brand, or either, shall pay to the Secretary, in cash, before recording the same, the sum of ten cents.

3rd. It shall be the duty of the Parish Union Secretary to provide a mark and brand book, to be paid for from the Parish Union revenues; and in it he shall transcribe all marks and brands sent to him with their names and postoffice address of their owners, and that each mark and brand shall, before being recorded, be paid for at the rate of fifteen cents for the recordation of same.

4th. It shall be the duty of the Parish Union Secretary to answer all inquiries made by persons having their marks and brands so recorded, and to give notice to all sub-union secretaries when stock may be strayed or stolen, and he is properly notified to do so.

5th. All Union members are requested to give as early as possible any information regarding stray stock of any kind which may be in their neighborhoods, to the Parish Union Secretary; and it shall be the Secretary's duty to refer to his stock book to ascertain the owner thereof, failing to find same it shall be his duty to give notice, with description, on postal card to the secretaries of sub-unions in the parish of Rapides. B. F. Scott and H. F. Long were elected to represent us in the Farmers' State Union, to meet in Alexandria the 6th of August.
