—At their last meeting the Board of Trade appointed a committee of four, made up of C. H. Moise, G. A. Schuck, B. C. Duke and S. Cullen, to wait on the City Council and see if arrangements cannot be made to get a system of waterworks, also to request the same body to take action in enforcing the ordinance against the repairing of sidewalks.

—At the meeting held here on Saturday last, under the auspices of the Anti-Lottery Club of Alexandria, there were several prominent gentlemen on the stand, among them two or more who have held high office in Rapides. Now the question arises, and which we would like to propound is this: Do they, the said Rapidians, approve of the manner in which Mr. Farrar denounced ex State Treasurer Burke, and why? Do they further approve of what he said of the Jews? Do they approve of his calling the pine-woods people old women, children and ignorant fools. Oh, no! "the great apologist" arose to explain "the tricks that are vain and the ways that are mean, "this" heathen Chinese is peculiar." Under the advice of the Hon. G. W. Bolton he apologized.

—A special to the City Item, under date of the 12th inst., says: Miss Lavinia Fuller, a teacher from Michigan, sued the Parish School Board for a month's salary and the case was tried yesterday before Justice of the Peace W. W. Whittidgton. Capt. H. F. Long, the director of the Smith Mill school, which Miss Fuller taught, had got offended at her and ordered her to close her school on May 15th. The teacher did not heed this but continued to the end of her term, June 15th, and, on the representations of Capt. Long the School Board refused to pay for the last month. Capt. Long alleged in court that his action was based upon charges against Miss Fuller's character, but this was denied by the lady, who retorted that Capt. Long's ill will was solely due to the fact that he failed in inducing her to marry him. At this Capt. Long, who is of venerable age, blushed furiously, but did not deny the soft impeachment. Miss Fuller won her suit.

—Thos. H. Lewis, Esq., of this place, is reported in the New Orleans Delta of a recent date, to have said at the barbecue given at Woodworth Springs on the 27th ult., that a bond of only \$5,000,000 was no adequate security for \$31,000,000, which the revenue amendment will oblige the Louisiana State Lottery to pay to the State, in the event of its acceptance by the people.

—The anti's had their barbecue and speaking on Saturday, and the same did not prove so much of a success after all. The crowd was made up of pros and anti's, about equally divided, with ladies, children and a good number of colored people.

—On the occasion of his eightieth birthday, which anniversary occurred on Friday last, Mr. Joseph Fellows was presented with a pair of gold spectacles, by two of his friends, Messrs. Chas. Stewart and W. H. Brazzale. Col. Fellows is still in the finest health, having never been sick more than six hours in his life.

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Proceedings Special Meeting of City Council.

ALEXANDRIA, LA. } Sept. 14, 1891. } An adjourned meeting of the City Council was held this day at 4 o'clock p. m., with the following members present:

- N. L. McGinnis, Mayor, E. J. Sullivan, J. P. Grogan, R. W. Bringham, Absent—H. S. Gossens, J. A. Johnston.

The object of the meeting was to take some action in the matter of levying a tax for the year 1891.

The Assessor announcing that the assessment rolls could not be ready before October 1st, action in the matter was postponed until the next regular meeting.

The time for which the City Marshalls were elected having expired, on motion of Councilman Bringham Mr. J. J. Sullivan was re-elected by acclamation, and Mr. Norman White was elected in place of Mr. R. L. Raxsdale—the gentlemen elected to serve for 60 days.

On motion of Councilman Sullivan, Resolved, That all parties who contemplate building, repairing or making alterations in frame within the "Fire District," shall first obtain the consent of the street commissioners, and when any party or parties shall build, repair or alter without the said consent, they shall be fined \$50 for each and every day the said frame structure, repair or alteration shall remain after being notified by the street commissioners to have the same removed. (Carried.)

Mayor McGinnis reported verbally that Mr. Julius Levin had informed him that a thorough test of the hand fire engine "Lizzie" had been made, and the engine was found to be in first-class condition and was ready to answer all fire alarms within the corporate limits.

The Pacific Fire Co. reporting that the hose carriage was insufficient to carry the hose necessary, the Secretary was requested to communicate with proper parties in regard to the purchase of another carriage.

Mr. F. M. Welch came before the Board with the request that the Council make an appropriation of \$150, to assist in defraying the expense incurred in issuing 20,000 pamphlets, descriptive of the industries, enterprises, etc., of the City of Alexandria and Parish of Rapides.

On motion of Councilman Sullivan \$150 were appropriated for the above purpose, to be paid when there shall be funds in the treasury.

On motion the Board adjourned. N. L. MCGINNIS, Mayor. A. B. RACHAL, Secretary.

The reading of the minutes of the last regular meeting was, on motion, dispensed with.

The Treasurer's report was read and approved, showing a balance on hand of \$262.12.

The Collector's statement showed the following collections for month of August:
