We hope not, however.

—Mr. Henry Watterson expresses his opinion on the free coinage of silver in the following striking way:

"If the skies should rain silver and silver dollars should be heaped up in the valleys so that those who are making such an ado about more money could fill their sacks and baskets and could cart it away with them, it would under our unequal tariff system find its way back to the present custodians of the wealth of the country leaving the tax-idle farmer as poor as ever."

—The proposition for white primaries came originally from the pros. The antis afterwards adopted the same tactics, but when the State Central Committee met in New Orleans recently, seeing themselves in a minority they of course, side tracked their proposition, and put in their usual kick. The antis are a hard set to deal with anyhow. They make a proposition, and if you accede to it in the way of a vote and outnumber them in the result of same, why they skulk. They want the earth, and are not satisfied with giving the pros even a habitation. The pros are more liberal, however, and would treat them right if they were allowed to—but the antis are not men of that way.

WHAT THE MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE EXPOSED.

What did the proceedings of the late session of the Democratic State Central Committee expose? This, to the straight Democracy of Louisiana, is an important question. The *New Delta*, the Anti organ, alleges that it exposed "a deal" between the lottery and the city bosses. "At every vote," says that paper, "the City bosses were found on the side of the lottery," and thereupon it lifts its voice in solemn warning to the business men of New Orleans to defeat any such deal.

Now, as a matter of fact, the Committee did not "learn" the people that there had been any such deal as that charged, between the lottery and "the City bosses." Nor was there anything in the proceedings of the Committee to justify the charge that "the City bosses voted in a body for the lottery."

The Committee, did, however, teach the people of Louisiana several important things. One of these things is, that there were two parties in the Committee—first: The extreme Antis who had and have no other purpose in view than the defeat of the revenue or lottery amendment; who are, so far from being Democrats that they are willing and ready to sacrifice the Democratic party and white supremacy, and to ally themselves with the Farmers' Alliance, the Radicals of the Warmoth stripe and the negroes, to accomplish their end, and who are resolved to trample upon and destroy every man in the State who antagonizes them. Secondly: There was the straight Democratic party, composed of Democrats who favor the adoption of the amendment, and the Democrats who, though opposed to the amendment, hold the unity of the party and white supremacy of paramount importance to either the rejection or ratification of that measure. The latter party, the Democratic party, desired to exclude the question of the amendment from the campaign by submitting the settlement of it to white Democratic primaries.

The first party, the Antis, would come in to such settlement and preferred to remain free to make combinations with the Alliance, the Radicals and the negroes, to defeat the amendment and secure political control of the State, even at the cost of destroying white supremacy in Louisiana.

The chief end the Democrats, who constituted the majority of the Committee, had in view was, not the ratification or rejection of the lottery amendment; some of them, most of them, favored that amendment as a source of public revenue and relief to the taxpayers; several of them, on the other hand, were opposed to the amendment on grounds satisfactory to themselves; but both elements fought, and fought only, for the harmony of the Democracy and the maintenance of white supremacy.

The extreme Antis were to a man furiously opposed to the amendment, and they had no other politics. Hence the "city bosses," being Democrats, voted solidly and on every roll call, not as is alleged by the *Delta*, for the lottery, but for the integrity and triumph of Democracy. And, as a believer in Democratic principles, as one of those recognizing that the supremacy of the whites is necessary to the maintenance of our christian civilization and the promotion of our prosperity, we prefer, by all odds, to stand with these "city bosses," to being in accord with a party led by "Hannibal Hell fire" Stubbs, the ferocious Cunninghamham, the windy and furious Pierson, the cantankerous Price, the learned and eloquent crank Farrar, who would rather be a pimp in a house of prostitution than a holder of lottery stock; the learned and eloquent savage Gunby, who would dash out the brains of his children on the curb stones, with his own hands, than have them taught in schools supported by lottery money, and the whole gang of malignants who are for Winchester rifles, bloody war, "hell fire," "niggers," Radicals and Federal usurpation for the purpose of achieving their end.

We are not talking at random. Many good and true men who could not mistrust their Democracy, have been led astray by these fierce and declamatory Anti leaders. The proceedings of the Convention have shown them their mistake; have shown them, these men, in their true light. Those proceedings have shown the people that these men, to accomplish a particular end of their own, are ready to destroy the Democratic party, if they cannot boss it; to yield white supremacy to negro domination, if that be necessary to reach their end; to give the Radicals a new chance to aid them to defeat the revenue amendment; to yield up the precious and blood bought principle of State rights, the principle that Jefferson and all his illustrious compatriots and successors

in Democracy, have held to be the foundation stone, bulwark and life of our free American institutions, if the power which sought to impose the Force Bill upon us, will intrude in our local affairs, usurp the police powers of Louisiana, and stretch forth its mailed and willing hand to establish their fanatic cause when the free people of Louisiana shall have defeated it. And taxpayers of Louisiana, farmers, workmen, needy women and children, veterans of a hundred bloody fields, what is the purpose which these men have in view and which they are ready to purchase at such a cost and such treason to the Democratic party?

Why the defeat of the lottery amendment, a fiscal measure by which the State, without the fraction of a mill of additional taxation, will receive one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars per annum for the levees, schools, charities and veterans of the State [New Orleans States.

FUNERAL SERMON

DELIVERED BY REV. FATHER L. MENARD, OCT. 21st, 1891.

ON THE OCCASION OF THE DEATH OF SADIE, BELOVED WIFE OF CHAS. E. BRINGHURST.

"Let my soul die the death of the just, and my last end be like to them."—Numbers 23, 10.

When the hosts of Israel were encamped over against Moab, a soothsayer whom God had transformed into a prophet, under divine inspiration exclaimed: "How beautiful are thy tabernacles, O Jacob, and thy tents, O Israel! As woody valleys, as watered gardens near the rivers, as tabernacles which the Lord had pitched, as colonies by the water side."—Numbers 24, 5.

The order of the tribes, as they marched on to the promised land, the serried ranks of the panoplied warriors, the superior bravery with which they had overcome their foes, elicited Balaam's admiration and prompted his enthusiasm. But from an admirer he became a suppliant, and, on being supernaturally enlightened as to the glorious destinies of the wayfarers, he cried out: "Let my soul die the death of the just, and my end be like unto them."

It is not my intention to divert your thoughts from her whose knell has stirred such echoes of sympathy from so large a number of friends, a circle broader than that of which we form a part—from the kind mother who drew these children, from their earliest development to the love of divine things—from the sincere soul whose piety bent the homage of men as it won the applause of God—nor of the kind friend whom we all hope to meet again, when we are all harbored again in eternal glory. No, my brethren, for though we see but the form which once embodied all that is dear to you, though we stand before the lifeless frame, now enshelled by death into eternal calm, let us hold her as she was under the hand of death, before the last breathing was over, and the divine Bridegroom called her departing soul.

1. When Jesus Christ spoke to men, for the first time, He said: "Blessed are the clean of heart, for they shall see God." It had been said before that they who are deified cannot enter through the gates of the holy city.

I do not merely say that Mrs. Bringhurst was familiar with these truths. To be just to her memory, I must add that what she believed, she acted out in practice. She knew that, of all evils, moral evil is the greatest. She knew that, of all moral evils, mortal guilt is the deadliest. But she knew, too, with the certainty of faith, that Christ Jesus left to His church, the fullness of His forgiving power. Hence it is that, as she was faithful in life, she was found faithful unto death. Kneeling to grace, which divine love had poured out on her, she did not put off till the last moment, the confession of her sins. Like the royal penitent, whose appeal for mercy was on her lips, she begged to be purified more and more. Firm resolves preceded holy absorption, God's sentence of mercy, quick action, and a true repentance, as spoken by human lips, gave her the sweet assurance that she had been received into favor. What shall I say of the satisfactory value of those sufferings, mental and physical, the last drop of which was so bravely drained? What shall I say of that agony caused by the approaching separation of daughter from mother, of sister from brothers, of mother from children, of a loving wife from a loving consort with whom she expected to pass her life in administering and receiving mutual comfort?

This did she appear to you who watched, with trembling silence, over her dying couch. Thus did she begin to purify her soul with sacramental grace. This she sought to merit, by faithful correspondence to grace, that God should shed upon her dying eyes, the peaceful and happy light of the kingdom which she manfully strove to conquer. "Let my soul, etc."

II. I pass on to another part which would not be developed, were I not fully satisfied that what was the applause of God cannot fail to bend the homage of men.

We are divinely informed that, on one occasion, Jesus was transfigured on Tabor's heights; that His sacred countenance outshone the golden orb in its meridian splendor, and that His garments appeared as white as the drifted snow. This supernatural event was intended to give the witnesses and beholders a glimpse of the glory to come.

But He came to seek and save that which was lost, determined to complete the series of His benefits, not by manifesting, but by concealing and shrouding His glory under the appearances of our corporal food. "He that eats me, the same shall live by me," etc. "He that eats my flesh and drinks my blood has everlasting life, and I will raise him up at the last day."

Some of His hearers reasoned away the glorious announcement; and the disciples who had followed Him two years went back and walked no longer with Jesus. They thought that to be the Savior and to be crucified was a contradiction, and that, in becoming our food, He would demean Himself too low. But Jesus who had loved His own, loved them to the end, and His promise was solemnly redeemed. Besides renewing our inward life and conferring on men a divine sonship, He is near us, He is within us in the communion of His body and blood. He is near us when our light is low and pain is at its height. He is near us, when life is failing away.

The singular intimacy which we enjoyed with Him when the soul knew no sorrow and the body no pains, must, by the will of God and our own, become closer as the end approaches. Like the Ruler's son we must not only be visited by Him, but He comes to transform our hearts into living shrines of His adorable body and blood before we are conformed in glory, to Him who is so divinely tender in His love.

The Church, the mother of our souls, will allow none of her children to depart this life, without being previously fortified with living Bread which comes down from Heaven. The saving host must be deposited on lips of the dying christian to make Him

Happy with the nearness of God; Strong with the graces God sheds on those whom sufferings had caused to grow unto likeness with Him; Bold in the last conflict with the Evil One.

Victorious in the contest which will end with our last breath.

Such was the provision of mercy made by Jesus Christ in favor of His own. How was it appreciated by her whom we now mourn, and whose soul, we hope, is quickened by the glance of God?

Ready to do, to the last, all that falling strength allowed, she summoned all the powers of her generous soul to do homage to the divine Guest, in Eucharistic disguise. Worn out by protracted disease, she besought her Savior in the words of Lazarus' friends: "She whom thou lovest is sick."

Disengaged from all earthly objects, she made her own the aspirations of divine love with which the exile of Jesus, the inspired volume: "Lord Jesus, come."

Although death stared her in the face, she viewed it with sweet serenity, with the tranquility of innocence, and smiled at the thought that she was going to enjoy the vision of God. *Credo videre bona Domini in terra viventium.*

During our last hour, dear to her Creator, whom in Real Presence she adored, that Everlasting Presence which was her guide and stay in other days, but now her only joy and comfort in her overpowering anxieties, she opened her hallowed lips to receive her Savior, mingling the tears of repentance with the tears of a last farewell to her friends. Thus did she launch into eternity, transfigured in the world of light where the Good Shepherd gathers His sheep on the Everlasting Hills. "Let my soul," etc.

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Now, my brethren, before you whisper the last good-bye to your dear and lamented sister in Christ, allow me to repeat for your comfort the words of Jesus to the sister of Lazarus: "Thou shalt see him again."

We may cherish this hope, if we die the death of the just, if our end be like unto theirs. For the victory of death is short lived. The flowers have fallen, but they will rise again in an eternal spring. The river is frozen, but a new light and sun of the Resurrection will liberate it from its frozen fetters, and it shall flow for all eternity. "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?"

Now, hear ye her forth to the little green mound, where she was wont to go daily to offer up her prayers for the departed, and where now children and mother will lie in the same grave (cherish her memory; and as you love to remember her deeds of kindness, treasure up her dying requests and last recommendations. Listen to her hitherto unspoken wish: "Pray for my soul." And, above all, let the example of a life well spent, with and for you, animate us all to strive to merit all that faith and hope promise us of joy and glory eternal. "Let my soul die the death of the just, and my last end be like to them."
