A shooting affray occurred at the Stonewall Hotel, in this city, last Thursday morning, between F. G. Key, lessee of the Exchange Hotel before its destruction by fire and R. F. Curtis, representing I. L. Lyons & Co. wholesale druggists, of New Orleans. Several shots were exchanged and both participants wounded, though not dangerously. Curtis used a 38 calibre 5 shot Smith & Wesson revolver. Key had a double barreled derringer, both barrels of which were fired. Curtis was shot in the ight hand, as he was in the act of drawing his weapon, so he informed a representative of the Louisi-ANA DEMOCRAT.
