CHAPTER IV.  
BATTLE OF RESACA DE LA PALMA

On the morning of the 9th of May, 1846, the enemy, who had been encamped near the battle-field of the day previous, was discovered moving by his left flank, evidently in retreat, and perhaps, at the same time, with a view to gain a new position on the road to Matamoros; and there again to resist the advance of the American army.

General Taylor ordered the supply train to be strongly packed at its position, and left with it four pieces of artillery—the two 18-pounders, which had done such good service on the previous day, and two 12-pounders, which had not been in the action. The wounded officers and men were at the same time sent back to Point Isabel.

He then moved forward with the columns to the edge of the chaparral or forest, which extends to the Rio Grande, a distance of 7 miles. The light companies of the first brigade, under Captain C. F. Smith, of the 2d artillery, and a select detachment of light troops—the whole under the command of Captain McColl, of the 4th infantry—were thrown forward into the chaparral to feel the enemy and ascertain his position.

About 3 o'clock in the day a report was received from the advance, that the enemy was in position on the road with at least two pieces of artillery. The command was immediately put in motion, and about 4 o'clock, it came up with Captain McColl, who reported the enemy in force, in front, occupying a ravine which intersects the road and which is skirted by thickets of dense chaparral.

Ridgeley's battery and the advance under Captain McColl, were at once thrown forward on the road and into the chaparral on either side, while the 5th infantry and one wing of the 4th were thrown into the forest on the left, and the 3d and the other wing of the 4th into the forest on the right of the road. These corps were employed as skirmishers to cover the battery and engage the Mexican infantry. Capt. McColl's command became at once engaged with the enemy, while the light artillery, though in a very exposed position, did great execution. The enemy had at least 8 pieces of artillery, and maintained an incessant fire upon the advance of the American line.

The action now became general, and though the enemy's infantry gave way before the steady fire and resistless progress of the American infantry, yet his artillery was still in position to check their advance—several pieces occupying the pass across the ravine, which he had chosen for his position. Perceiving that no decisive advantage could be gained until the artillery was silenced, Gen. Taylor ordered Captain May to charge the batteries with his squadron of dragoons. This was gallantly and effectually executed. The enemy was driven from his guns, and General La Vega, who remained alone at one of the batteries, was taken prisoner. The squadron suffered much in this charge, and not being immediately supported by infantry, could not retain possession of the artillery taken, but it was completely silenced. In the mean time the 8th infantry had been ordered up and had become warmly engaged on the right of the road. This regiment and a part of the 5th were now directed to charge the batteries, which was handsomely done, and the enemy was entirely driven from his artillery and his position on the left of the road.

The light companies of the 1st brigade, and the 3d and 4th regiments of infantry, had been deployed on the right of the road, where, at various points, they became briskly engaged with the enemy. A small party, under Captain Buchanan and Lieutenants Wood and Hays, of the 4th infantry, composed chiefly of men of that regiment, drove the enemy from a breast-work he occupied, and captured a piece of artillery. An attempt to recover this piece was repelled by Captain Barbour of the 3d infantry. The enemy was at last completely driven from his position on the right of the road, and he retreated precipitately, leaving baggage of every description. The 4th infantry took possession of a camp where the headquarters of the Mexican General-in-Chief were established. All his official correspondence was captured at this point.

The artillery battalion (excepting the flank companies) had been ordered to guard the baggage-train, which was packed some distance in the rear. That battalion was now ordered up to pursue the enemy, and with the 3d infantry, Captain Ker's dragoons and Captain Duncan's battery, they followed him rapidly to the river, making a number of prisoners. Great numbers of the enemy were drowned in attempting to cross the river near Matamoros. The corps last mentioned encamped near the river, the remainder of the army on the field of battle.
