PROPOSALS FOR AMERICAN WATER RETTED HEMP.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION, EQUIPMENT, &c. 4th October, 1845.

SEALED PROPOSALS, endorsed "Proposals for the Hemp to be used in the United States for the 15th December next, for delivering one hundred and fifty tons of American water-retted hemp, at such storehouse in each of the cities of Louisville, Kentucky, and St. Louis, in Missouri, as may be designated by the United States hemp agent at those places; the deliveries to be made between the first day of March and the first day of July, 1846, and accompanied by satisfactory evidence that it has been water-retted in the usual manner, &c. &c. The hemp must be thoroughly dressed, cleaned, free from shivers, and must not lose more than sixteen per cent. of low and waste when batchelled, in the satisfaction of the inspectors, ready for spinning. Its strength must be such as to rope one and three-fourths of an inch in circumference, made from twenty-one yarns, as prepared and tested by the inspectors, or by their direction, will bear at least four thousand two hundred pounds, and its length must not exceed that of seventy-two feet, satisfactory to the inspectors, or the chief of this bureau, or it will not be received. It will be inspected and tested at the respective places of delivery.

For the hemp which may pass inspection and be received by the agent, he and the inspector will certify bills (for not less than one thousand dollars, the last bill excepted); according to the provisions of the contract ninety per cent. to be payable in cash, and within thirty days after the presentation of the bills to such thirty days may be agreed upon by the chief of this bureau and the contractor.

Persons offering must offer for at least thirty tons, and must state the usual manner, in words at length) asked per ton of 2,240 pounds when delivered, inspected, tested, and received by the agent and inspector, and payable as above specified, and must forward with their offer an obligation, duly executed by two persons of known responsibility, binding themselves for the performance of the offer, if they should be accepted.

Bonds to one-half the amount of the contract, and must be made with two good and sufficient sureties, will be required for their faithful execution, in addition to a deduction of ten per cent. from all bills which may be approved and paid before the completion of the contract, which will be retained until they are fully completed, in all respects, according to their terms.
