PROPOSALS FOR AMERICAN WATER

RETTED HEMP.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION, EQUIPMENT, &c., 4th October, 1845.

SEALED PROPOSALS, endorsed "Proposals for Retted Hemp," will be received at this bureau until the 15th December next, for delivering one hundred and fifty tons of American water-retted hemp, at each storehouse in each of the cities of Louisville, Kentucky, and St. Louis, in Missouri, as may be designated by the President of the United States; the deliveries to be made between the first day of March and the first day of July, 1846, and accompanied by satisfactory evidence that it has been water-retted in the usual manner.

The hemp must be thoroughly dressed, cleaned, free from shivers, and must not lose more than sixteen per cent. of tow and waste when hatched, to the satisfaction of the inspectors, ready for spinning.

The strength must be such, that a rope of one and three-quarters an inch in circumference, made from twenty-one yarns, as prepared and tested by the inspectors, or by their direction, will bear at least four thousand two hundred pounds; and carry the load for three days, without breaking.

Proposals, if they are to be received, must be made in writing, and must be accompanied by a certificate of the inspectors, or of the chief of this bureau, or it will not be received. It will be inspected and tested at the respective places of delivery.

The hemp which may pass inspection and be received by the agent, he and the inspector will certify bills (for not less than one thousand dollars, the last bill excepted), according to the provisions of the contract, and must be made up in words at length) asked per ton of 2,340 pounds when delivered, inspected, tested, approved, and received by the agent and inspector, and payable as above specified, and must forward with their offer an obligation, under the seal of the contractor, to provide, among other things, that the pay of the trip is to be forfeited when the trip is not performed, and a due proportion when a grade of service is rendered inferior to that specified in the contract; and that fines may be lawfully levied on the contractor, as hereinafter explained in due time, for failing to take care, or to deliver into the post office at the port of landing, the mail belonging thereto, or any part of it, to be used, injured, lost, or destroyed; for carrying in a place or manner that exposes it to depreciation, loss, or injury; for refusing, after demand made, to convey a mail by any additional steamship or vessel, or to charter a vessel on the route, over and above the specified number of trips in the contract; and for not arriving at the time set; also for transmitting intelligence, or furnishing the means of transmitting intelligence, in advance of the mail.

The contractor must be bound to provide, in addition to the stipulated number of days, and hours than the one above specified. He may ask for an annual sum of compensation; or, in lieu thereof, a certain proportion of the postage accretion, on the mail-matter conveyed over the route; and he is authorized to carry the mail more frequently than once a week.

Articles of contract to be executed by the accepted bidder and his sureties, by or before the first day of March next, and to be approved by the President of the United States, and by the owner or owners, with an umpire in case of disagreement, to be appointed by the President of the United States.
