PROPOSALS FOR AMERICAN WATER RETTED HEMP.

NAVY DEPARTMENT. BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION, WASHINGTON, D. C. 24th October, 1845.

SEALED PROPOSALS, endorsed "Proposals for Hemp," will be received at this Bureau until the 15th December next, for delivering one hundred and fifty tons of American water-retted hemp, as such stockhouse in each of the cities of Louisville, Kentucky, and St. Louis, Missouri, as may be designated by the United States hemp agent at each place; the deliveries to be made between the first day of March and the first day of July, 1846, and accompanied by satisfactory evidence that it has been water-retted in the usual manner.

The hemp must be thoroughly dressed, cleaned, free from shivers, and must not lose more than sixteen per cent. of low and waste when hatched, to the satisfaction of the inspectors, ready for spinning. Its strength must be such, that a rope of one and three-fourths of an inch in circumference, made from twenty-one yarns, as prepared and tested by the inspectors, shall be capable of sustaining at least four thousand two hundred pounds; and its length, color, and other properties, must be entirely satisfactory to the inspectors, or the chief of this Bureau, or it will not be received. It will be accepted and tested at the respective places of delivery.

For the hemp which may pass inspection and be received by the agent, he and the inspector will certify (for not less than one thousand dollars, Kentucky, and not less than five hundred dollars, Missouri), in full, according to the provisions of the contract; ninety per cent. of which to be payable within thirty days after the presentation of the bills to such navy agent as may be agreed upon by the chief of this Bureau and the contractors.

Persons offering, must offer for at least thirty (written in words at length) aaked per ton of 2,240 pounds when delivered, inspected, tested, approved, and received by the inspectors, and the contractor, as above specified, and must forward with their offer an obligation, duly executed by two persons of known responsibility, binding themselves for the performance of the contract, and for the return of the bonds to one-half the amount of the contracts which may be made, with two good and sufficient sureties, will be required for their faithful execution, in addition to a deduction of ten per cent. on all bills which may be approved and paid before the completion of the contracts, which will be retained until they are fully completed, in all respects, according to their terms.

Offers must be made in strict conformity with the terms of this advertisement.

If contracts are not executed within five days after they have been received by the persons whose offers have been accepted, the Bureau will consider the offer void, and will offer to the next lowest responsible bidder.

MAILS TO GALVESTON.

PROPOSALS to carry the mails of the United States, from the 1st of March, 1846, to the 29th of February, 1850, with right to the department to extend to the 30th of June, 1850, from New Orleans to Galveston, Texas, 400 miles by sea and back, will be received at the Contract Office of the Post Office Department, until the 25th day of January, 1846, to be decided by the 31st day of said January.

Leave New Orleans every Saturday at 10 a. m., arrive at Galveston every Monday by 10 a. m.

Leave Galveston every Tuesday at 10 a. m., arrive at New Orleans every Thursday by 10 a. m.

The proposals should specify the mode of conveyance, whether by steam-ship or sailing-ship, and set forth the size, rate, and description of the vessel, with sufficient particularity to enable the decision to be made, on the advice of the proper officers of the naval service, whether the same is or is not conversion of a ship-of-war. And special notice is hereby given, that, agreeably to the provisions of an act of Congress, approved March 3d, 1845, those proposals (being acceptable in other respects) which are made by a vessel engaged in the mail in steam-ship or ships, and shall stipulate to deliver said ship or ships to the United States, or to their proper officer, on demand made, for the purpose of being converted into a vessel or vessels, whether by steam-ship or sailing-ship, and their part to pay the fair full value thereof at the time of delivery, to be ascertained by four appraisers—appointed, two by the President of the United States, and two by the owner or owners, with an umpire in case of disagreement, to be appointed by the President of the United States.

The bidder may propose a different schedule of days and hours than the one above specified. He may also propose an annual sum of compensation, or, in lieu thereof, a certain proportion of the postage accruing on the mail-matter conveyed over the route; and he may offer to carry the mail more frequently than once a week.

An article of contract to be executed by the accepted bidder and by his sureties, or before the first day of March next. The contract is to provide, among other things, that the pay of the trip is to be forfeited when the grade of mail is rendered inferior to that specified in the contract; and that fines may be imposed, unless the delinquency be satisfactorily explained in due time, for failing to take the mail, or delivering it at a later hour than specified in the contract; and for conveying the mail, or any part of it, to be injured, lost, or destroyed; for conveying it in a place or manner that exposes it to depreciation, or for conveying it by a route or mode of conveyance not approved by the Postmaster General; and for not arriving at the time; and also for transmitting the mail by any other mode than that specified in the contract, and for not conveying it in accordance with the intelligence, in advance of the mail. The Postmaster General may annul the contract for repeated failures; for violating the post office laws; for disobeying the orders of the department; for refusing to discharge a carrier when required by the department; for assigning the contract without the consent of the Postmaster General; or for setting up or running an express, as aforesaid.

The route, the service, the yearly pay, the bid-amount, and the residue of each member of each contract where a company offers, should be distinctly stated in the proposals.

The following is the form of the guarantee, which should be filed, in the first blank with the name of the guarantor, the second with that of the bidder, and the third and fourth with the beginning and terminating points of the route; and, after being dated, should be signed by the guarantor, who must be shown, by the written certificate of a postmaster, or other authorized officer of the department, to be of property, and able to make good his guarantee. This guarantee, so certified, should accompany each bid.

"The undersigned ——— guarantees that ———, I am bid for carrying the mail, to ———, shall enter into an obligation prior to the 1st day of March next, with good and sufficient sureties, to perform the service proposed.

The bid should be sent under seal to the First Assistant Postmaster General, and the words "Mail proposals—Galveston mail," written on the face of the letter, and should be despatched in time to be received by or before the 25th day of January next, to be opened on the 31st day of January next, at the Post Office Department, in Washington, D. C.
