Sealed proposals will be received at the Commissioners office on Monday of Court week until 5 o'clock, P. M. for the erection of Stone Steps and Platform in front of the Court House, the steps are to run down at the North and South ends of the platform.

The whole length of stone work at the bottom or lower step will be 34 feet long and 5 feet high in front above ground, except what will be taken off by each step. The length of the platform will be 19 feet 9 inches long and 10 feet 6 inches wide—there will be 8 steps at each end—each will be 10 feet 6 inches long—steps 1 foot wide and rises 7 1/2 inches high (exposed)—to lap 6 inches and dress 18 by 7 1/2 inches where the steps extend over the main wall in front—the other stone work to range with the steps. The stones forming the platform with coping included will be 7 1/2 inch thick where exposed at the front. The coping and steps will extend 3 inches over the main wall in front. All stones to be perfectly sound, particularly the steps' front face of wall and platform, to be built up solid from front wall to the house. The stones on the platform to range with the top step and coping—to be of dressed line or sand stone—built on a good solid foundation, under ground, not less than 2 feet deep and wide.

The steps, stones and bricks now forming the steps are reserved, but the contractor is to remove them.
