Making an average of 40 per month, of whom 5 are colored. There are also 5 who are blind, 12 insane and 7 who are confined to beds.

There were also 4 out-door paupers who are not included in the above. Funeral and other expenses were also paid for 5 deceased paupers in the County who were unable to be brought to the Poor House. Bills were paid for boarding and medical attendance for paupers who were sick in different parts of the County—120 waxing persons were provided with board, lodging &c., of whom 65 were from Germany, 31 from Ireland, 5 from France, 4 from Denmark, 4 from Sweden, 4 from Italy, 1 from Poland, 1 from Scotland, 1 from England and 30 Americans.

## SCHOOL EXHIBITION.

Held on Friday evening, March the 13th, at the Church in Stonerstown, by Jas. F. Fay.

At an early hour the pupils assembled in the School-room, opposite the Church, to await the gathering of parents and friends. Ere the light of day had entirely faded from the western horizon, the church, though spacious, was crowded with anxious visitors. Old and young assembled from all parts of the neighborhood to witness for the first time in their history, a "school exhibition." The pupils then marched into the church, where apartments were curtained off for their accommodation, and a stage erected, and beautifully decorated with wreaths and garlands. The time for opening having arrived, an able and appropriate address was given by the teacher, after which the regular exercises of the evening were gone through with, consisting of 25 or 30 pieces, viz:—Speeches, Orations, amusing Dialogues, &c., during which time the spectators by their enthusiasm and smiles of approbation, evinced their appreciation of the performances. The exhibition was highly praiseworthy, and reflects credit upon teacher and pupils. The manner of delivery, the collectedness and composure with which the various pieces were performed, would have been creditable to some of our higher institutions of learning. The scene was enlivened at intervals with vocal music, by Mr.
