Making an average of 40 per month, of whom 2 are colored. There are also 4 who are blind, 11 insane, 4 confined to bed. There were also 5 out door paupers, who are not included in the above figures, and other expenses were also paid for 2 deceased paupers in the county who were unable to be brought to the Poor House. Bills were paid for boarding and medical attendance for pauper who were sick in different parts of the county—212 way-faring paupers were provided with board, lodging, &c., of whom 129 were from Germany, 52 from Ireland, 12 from England, 5 from France, 2 from Sweden, and 12 were Americans.
