Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same: That John Mann, E. L. And provided further that it shall be lawful for any railroad company whose road is located, or which may hereafter be located in the counties of Bedford, Somerset or Huntingdon, to subscribe to the capital stock of said Company to any amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.
