June 4, 1858. Railroad connection with Chambersburg.—The Valley Spirit, of last week, has the following in regard to a railroad from Chambersburg to this county:

We learn from a friend at Bedford that the gun required to grade a railroad from Bedford East to Hopewell, will all be subscribed before the close of two weeks. This road will be laid along Haver's survey of a route from Chambersburg to Bedford.

The Sherman's Valley and Broad Top Railroad Company last week put under contract 23 miles of their road, commencing at the East-end. This road is designed to run from the Susquehanna river, at a point six miles above Harrisburg, to Cumberland, Md. Its route runs into Haver's survey in the neighborhood of Burnt Cabins, Fulton county, and follows it to Bedford.

Should the Sherman's Valley Railroad be pushed forward to completion, we would have but about thirty miles of road to make to connect with it in Fulton county. We will be the greatest fools in the world, if we don't make the connection, for the one thing needful to the people of Franklin county is a Railroad west to the Broad Top Coal beds. We shall never get cheap Lumber or cheap Coal till we have a Railroad from here to Bedford county, and we shall never be able to engage in manufactures to any extent till we get Lumber and Coal at low rates.

A "Vigilance Committee" in the Crescent City.—New Orleans has within the last week been the scene of great confusion and excitement. A large number of the citizens—among whom are many of the most respectable and influential men in the city—have organized themselves into a "Vigilance Committee" and have taken the control of the municipal affairs into their own hands.

Their first step was to take possession of the Arsenal, before which they raised cotton barricades, thus fortifying themselves against the forces of the Mayor who at first threatened to put them down. Their next movement was to establish a police of their own and to restore order and quiet to the city. At last accounts, the Mayor had placed himself under their protection, whilst the Know Nothings had determined to resist them and had issued inflammatory placards to their partisans, calling upon them to come to their assistance. The cause of this insurrectionary movement is attributed to the unrestrained commission of crime and the loose morals of the city government which has been in the hands of the Know Nothings for some years.

Death of a U. S. Senator.—Hon. JOHN P. HENDERSON, U. S. Senator from Texas, died at his lodgings in Washington City, on Friday evening. He had been suffering for several months with a pulmonary disease.

A Mistake.—We learn that the impression prevails in some parts of this county, that the subscription of \$75,000 to the Bedford Railroad obtained by Mr. SCHILL, is an appropriation by the State. This is a mistake! Private individuals have made that subscription and are ready to subscribe as much more as can be raised in Bedford county over and above that sum.

STAGE SWEET AWAY.—On Tuesday night last, about ten o'clock, as the two horse stage which runs from Mount Union to Chambersburg, owned by Mr. John Jameson, was crossing a swollen stream in the Narrows, eight miles north of Burnt Cabins, it was swept away by the current, and both horses drowned. The only passenger in the stage lost his trunk. The mail bag was also lost, but was found about two miles down the stream. The drowned horses and the coach, which was broken to pieces, were also swept down the stream about a mile before they were recovered. Mr. Jameson's loss is estimated at four hundred and fifty dollars.

DEMOCRATIC VICTORY.—At the municipal election in New Haven, on Monday, the Democrats elected their candidate for Mayor and all the other city officers, and carried three of the six wards. The opposition united on a "Citizens ticket." The majority for Mayor was 551.
