The National Foundry.—The Committee on Military Affairs of the House of Representatives, have referred to the Hon. C. J. FACKLER, of Virginia, the leading and working man of that Committee, all memorials and other papers relating to the establishment of a National Foundry, with a view to a full and elaborate report upon the same to the next session of Congress.

Death of distinguished Philadelphians.—Hon. R. T. Conrad, known universally as the author of "Jack Cad," and Hon. J. R. Tyson, formerly member of Congress from Philadelphia, both died, on Sunday last, the former at his home in West Philadelphia, and the latter at his country residence in Montgomery county.

Judge Conrad was about fifty years of age. Some of his literary productions were of a high order of excellence and gave him an enviable reputation. As a politician he was unsuccessful, although he filled at one time the important office of Mayor of the city, and subsequently that of Judge of the Court of Common Pleas.

Mr. Tyson was somewhat older than Judge Conrad; he died the fifty-fifth year of his age, universally respected and beloved for his many integrity, general benevolence, and warm devotion to the interests and prosperity of this great Commonwealth. He has occupied a proud position in the public estimation, both as a member of the State Legislature and that of Representative in Congress. He leaves an unspotted reputation, and his death will be universally deplored.

A NEW COUNTERFEIT, of the denomination of \$10, on the State Bank of Ohio, has made its appearance in Cincinnati. It was taken on deposit at one of the leading banking houses in that city on Monday last, and it is pronounced by the best judges to be the best executed and most dangerous counterfeit now in circulation. The Gazette says: The country will undoubtedly be flooded with them. Several have been sent here, already, from New York, where they were received as genuine. Refuse all notes of ten dollars on the branches of the State Bank of Ohio.

Col. Steptoe's Fight With The Indians. SAN FRANCISCO, June 5, 1858.

The steamer Panama arrived this morning from the north, and brings the following intelligence concerning the reported battle between Col. Steptoe and the Indians. The Olympia Pioneer and Democrat of May 28 says:—Just as we are getting our paper ready for press, an express arrived from Col. Steptoe, in the Simcoe Valley, with despatches from Lieut. Col. Cassey and letters from his Excellency, Gov. McMullan, informing them of the defeat, on the 16th inst., at the first crossing of the Snake river, about thirty miles above its junction with the Columbia, of the command of Colonel Steptoe.

The command consisted of five companies, or four hundred men. The Indians are reported to have been fifteen hundred strong, and composed of the Snake, Pohose and other tribes.—The action resulted in three officers and fifty men killed. Two of the officers killed are Capt. Wynder and Lieut. Gazden. The Indians took two howitzers which belonged to the command and all but sixty pack animals.

In fact so complete has been the rout that the officer in command was compelled to fall back with the utmost precipitation. The battle took place while the regulars were in the act of crossing the river. Col. Steptoe had proceeded into the Snake country peacefully to treat with them, or proceed to hostilities if necessary.—The object of his visit was probably of a similar character with that of Major Haller, which resulted in a like unfortunate manner. Major Haller proceeded there with one hundred and four men, and in the peaceable manner of the emigrants in 1854. He returned without the emigrants, but with twenty-two of his command killed and wounded on litters.

It is much to be feared we are on the eve of a general outbreak among the savages in the north and it is quite probable that they have been incited, or are now urged on by Mormon emissaries. General Clarke has ordered reinforcements to proceed at once to the Columbia river, to scene of hostilities. The sloop-of-war St. Marys, now lying at Mare Island Navy Yard, has received orders also to sail for Puget Sound, to cooperate with the land forces. She will be ready in a few days to start.

Fourth of July.—The coming Anniversary of American Independence will be celebrated in Bedford, by the Bedford Riflemen, on Saturday the 31 day of July.

The Declaration of Independence will be read by R. D. BARCLAY, Esq., and an oration will be delivered by JOHN H. COLLIER, Esq.

The dinner will be served by Col. Hafer, of the "Bedford Hotel."
