MR. MEYERS: I see by the last issue of the Bedford Inquirer, that a letter to "Mr. Reed," purporting to have been written by you, in regard to Mr. Hall's claims as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Assembly, is published in that paper. Now, I take this method of stating that I never received any such letter from you.

AARON REED.
