SURGICAL FREE OF TAX.—The Internal Revenue Commissioner, in reply to inquiries whether there is any internal duty on the products of sorghum, replies that molasses and sugar made from sorghum or imphee, are, and have been since the passage of the act of March 3d, 1865, exempt from duty.
