From Mexico. NEW YORK, November 6.—The Herald's city of Mexico correspondence says: Maximilian appointed Marshal Bazaine temporary Regent, and took his departure for Vera Cruz, on the 21st, going around about way, to avoid meeting General Castelnau, who was at the same time en route from Vera Cruz to Mexico. The Ministry upon hearing of the appointment of Bazaine immediately resigned.

CASTELNAU arrived at the Capital on the 23d, and took on himself the administration of the government. An Austrian frigate at Vera Cruz was awaiting Maximilian's arrival to depart for Europe.

A DISPATCH from Washington says: It is not probable that General Sherman's letter will be made public, but a gentleman who has seen it, says it is a brief but cordial endorsement of the President. It was written on the last day of last February, and is a voluntary act on the part of the General.
