LOCAL NEWS.
PRESIDENT'S DRAWING-ROOM.—This is the regular evening for the public reception of ladies and gentlemen by the President, at the Executive Mansion, commencing at 8 o'clock, p. m.

CITY COUNCIL.—Board of Aldermen.—The monthly report of the intendant of the asylum was presented: referred to the committee on the asylum.

Mr. Smith offered the following resolution:
Resolved, That the mayor be, and he is hereby, requested to cause a statement to be furnished to this board of the amount of appropriations, and the object for which they were made, since the 30th day of June last, specifying such as have been carried out by him, and such as have not.

In support of this resolution, Mr. Smith made the present indebtedness of the city \$1,955,155 29, instead of \$1,700,000 as he credits, as assumed by Mr. Moore last week.

The joint resolution granting the use of the school-rooms for the Observatory at the Sunday school near the western limit of the first ward was reported back from the committee on public schools: passed.

A bill authorizing the custodians to be set and the footway paved on the east side of 13th street east, between East Capitol street and North Carolina avenue, was recommitted to the committee on improvements.

Mr. Miller offered a joint resolution for the appointment of a delegate from the city council to attend the sanitary convention at Baltimore on the 20th of April.

A resolve to exempt from taxation the ground and house of the Western Hose Company so long as it shall be occupied for its present purpose was adopted.

Mr. Moore, from the committee on asylum, reported a bill appropriating one hundred dollars to enable the commissioners of the almshouse to transport to their homes, wherever they may deem it expedient, any non-resident pauper or paupers who shall become inmates of the Washington almshouse.

The board adjourned.

Common Council.—Mr. Brown presented a petition for gravel walk on D street south, between 4th and 6th streets: referred to committee on improvements.

Mr. Turton reported a bill authorizing the custodians to be set and the footway paved on C street south, between 3d and 4th streets west: passed.

An act reviving an act making appropriation to grade and gravel M street south, between 8th and 11th streets east, passed June 3, 1854: passed.

A bill making an appropriation of \$696 80 for grading 23d street, between F and H streets north, payable out of the funds of the First Ward, when the said ward shall be in funds, was reported from the committee on improvements: passed by yeas 6, nays 6.

A bill from the board of aldermen authorizing the construction of a sewer in F and 20th streets west, was referred to the committee on drainage.

A joint resolution from the upper board, authorizing the offer of a reward for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who fired the house used by the hook and ladder company in the Sixth ward was referred to the committee on the fire department.

Mr. Turton presented a bill for supplying deficiency of \$46 72 in appropriation for grading 25th street west, between Pennsylvania avenue and K street north: passed.

Mr. Brown presented a resolution as follows:
Resolved, That the committee on drainage and distribution of water be instructed to inquire and report what preliminary measures are necessary to be adopted by the city council to provide for the distribution of water to the citizens of Washington at the very earliest practicable period after its introduction on Pennsylvania avenue by the United States: adopted.

On motion of Mr. Wallace, the board adjourned.

BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.—Fifth Day.—Bishop Ames presided. After the consideration of the chapter of superannuated preachers, the following brethren were then elected managers of the Preachers' Aid Society: Preachers, Rev. W. B. Edwards, John S. Martin, Thomas Sewall, and R. H. Dashiell. Laymen, Isaac P. Cook, Robert Israel, and Dr. Roberts.

The new charter of the Education Society rendering it necessary to enlarge the board of managers, the resignations of the former members were submitted by Rev. Charles Collins, and accepted by the conference. On the part of the Baltimore conference, the following were then elected on the new board: Rev. Wm. Hamilton, Isaac T. Cook, C. J. Baker, and John Carson, esq.

Rev. David Thomas, from the committee on Dickinson College, submitted the annual report of that institution, accompanied by a series of resolutions commendatory of the same, and instructing the conference to assume a portion of the debt of \$18,000 now hanging over it. The report was accepted, and the resolutions were laid on the table.

It was announced that anniversary services would be held at Wesley Chapel in the evening, when addresses would be delivered by E. L. Faucher, esq.—subject: The Gospel and the Civilization of the World; Bishop James, D. D.—subject: Missions for Foreign Population in this Country, and to the Indians; Rev. T. M. Killy—subject: Our Western English Missions; J. P. Durbin, D. D.—subject: Rise, Extent, and Prospects of our Missions. This evening temperance addresses will be delivered in accordance with the following resolutions. The speakers will be announced in the evening papers:

1. Resolved, That we give special attention to the enforcement of the discipline with regard to the use of intoxicating drinks.
2. That we preach one or more sermons on the subject of temperance in all circuits and stations throughout the conference.
3. That, in accordance with the resolution adopted at the last session of the conference, that temperance meetings be held on Tuesday evening in all the Methodist Episcopal churches of this city, the committee on public worship are hereby requested to provide speakers for the occasion; which was adopted.

EUROPEAN NEWS.
The more important points of the news from Europe by the arrival published in the Union of Sunday morning. The matter of greatest interest from England is the defeat of the ministry in the House of Commons on the 6th inst. The reader will understand the matter from the following explanation:
Lord Palmerston, in moving the second reading of the conspiracy-to-murder bill, described its character at length, and repelled the notion that it was an alien bill, although he admitted that it had arisen out of the late attack in Paris.
Mr. Milner Gibson moved, by way of amendment— That those bills which have been introduced in England had been devised in England, and expressed the detestation of such guilty enterprises: that this House is ready at all times to assist in every way in the criminal law which, after due investigation, are proved to exist; yet it cannot but regret that Her Majesty's government, by proposing to introduce the House a bill to amend the conspiracy act at the present time, had not felt it to be their duty to make some reply to the important dispatch received from the French government, dated Paris, January 30, 1858, and which has been laid before Parliament.
There is still much feeling in England relative to its relations with Napoleon. A London correspondent indulges in the following speculations:
In the public mind here, Louis Napoleon has quite superseded India and the royal marriage. It is quite clear enough to all acute observers that he is disposed to quarrel with England, and that the famous *mitre cordiale* has suddenly ended, just like that which existed between Lord Aberdeen and the Emperor of the French. The present government is in the hands of professional or amateur resident artists—other gentlemen joining in the good work as associate "members." Such is the basis, we understand, of the *Washington Artists' Association*, and the following are its officers: President, Wm. McLeod; corresponding secretary, Philip Harry; recording secretary, T. S. Donoho; treasurer, J. M. Stanley.
