

DREADFUL CASUALTY.—One of the saddest occurrences which it has ever been our duty to record took place on Saturday morning last. A daughter of Dr. R. P. Blakistone, of Bollan Neck, in our county, aged 11 years, having occasion to perform some household duty in the kitchen, caught fire and her clothes soon became enveloped in flame. A servant who was present attempted to extinguish the fire, but without effect, and the child in its agony rushed into the yard where its cries soon attracted the attention of Mrs. Blakistone. Seeing its condition, this lady, with the brave and unselfish instincts of a mother, sought to put the fire out by enveloping the child with her own clothing, but finding this of no avail, she sought the house with a view of obtaining a blanket to smother the flames. Before she had proceeded many steps, she discovered her own clothing to be on fire, and all other efforts proving unavailing, she threw herself upon a bed and sought to smother the flames by drawing the covering around her. But this was without effect. The fire still progressed and soon the flames had done their work upon both sufferers. We draw a veil over the scene which met the eye of the husband and father upon reaching his desolated home.—Both wife and daughter were in extremis. Mrs. Blakistone survived but a few hours, and the child died during the afternoon of the day following.

Morgan, Esq., of this county, whither she soon after accompanied him, and where she continued to reside up to the time of her death—that death so sudden and unexpected has been the occasion of deep and sincere sorrow, not only to her own immediate family, but also to a wide circle of friends and neighbors who appreciated her many and rare virtues living—and sorrow for, and honor her dead.

Sweetness and good nature were visible in her face. "And in her speech was (ever) the law of kindness." Her religion, founded in reason and indubbed by hope and heaven-born charity, was exemplified by the cheerful and conscientious discharge of the duties of friend—neighbor—mother and wife. She was in truth and deed—a good and true woman—a perfect lady. "The heart of her husband did safely find in her."

"She stretched out her hands to the poor." "Yea, she reached out her hands to the needy." Words of flattery cannot reach "the cold ear of death," and to no vain or unworthy motive may be attributed this short and most imperfect sketch of so lovely a character, but rather to that law of our nature, that constrains us to bestow on the virtuous and lamented dead, just and impartial praise.
