**NOTICE TO TEACHERS.**

The Board of School Commissioners of St. Mary's County, at a meeting of the Board on Tuesday, the 9th, instant, ordered the publication of the following provisions of the School Law which have reference to the "modes of securing competent Teachers."

- Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of each Board of County School Commissioners to appoint a county examiner, whose duty it shall be to examine candidates for the profession of teaching, in the presence of at least three members of the Board of School Commissioners; to give to such persons as are found qualified, under the sanction of the said board, a certificate setting forth the branches such persons are competent to teach. But no certificate shall be granted without satisfactory evidence of the moral character of the applicant.
- Sec. 2. The certificates issued by each county examiner shall be numbered and registered in a book kept by the Board of County School Commissioners, and be delivered to their successors in office, and shall be denominated first or second grade as the case may be. Certificates of the first grade shall embrace orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, history, English grammar, book-keeping, algebra and natural philosophy, and the second grade shall embrace orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, history and English grammar.
- Sec. 3. No certificate of qualification as a teacher shall be issued to any male under nineteen years of age, or to female under seventeen years of age.
- Sec. 4. No certificate shall continue in force longer than three years.
