I applied the Guano at the rate of 350 lbs. per acre (as thick as the drill would sow it.) This application was made in 12 acres, one half sown in wheat, the other in Rye.

The grain grew well in the fall and both Wheat and Rye promised a fine crop in the spring, the grain has been harvested, and I am glad to say, I have reason to believe that the Rye will make an unusually fine yield, but the Wheat does not promise so well, owing to the Fly having damaged it very severely.
