THE HOUSE OF LORDS

During the last session of Congress General Schreck, he of Vienna fame, procured the passage of a resolution authorizing the Committee of Ways and Means to make an examination and revision of the tariff laws and regulations, to sit at such times and places as the chairman might deem proper, and to draw upon the Treasury for all necessary funds. What this committee has done, and is now doing, is thus stated by the Boston Post.

They met in New York about the middle of May, examined and revised the tariff laws regarding whiskey, wine and cigars, and then went to Philadelphia. There they occupied a number of suites of the most expensive rooms at the Continental, and went through at such an exhaustive "traveling" as to exhaust their search for knowledge here, however, was extended by the influence of Mr. Kelley, the tariff champion of the House, among the manufacturers of Pennsylvania, through the medium of excellent private dinners, given by the large manufacturers. Maudslowe, their hotel bills in the two cities amounted to \$13,000. But, not to confine the exercise of their vast economical knowledge to the States, they got on a five-day trip to California, with several friends and ladies, and many flowers landed in the business of "examining and revising" before alluded to. The trip will cost, they estimated, about \$50,000, in view of which, and of the impending expense by Butler, Schreck has fled to Europe. The rest go gaily jangling and the people pay the bills.

Queen Victoria and Prince Albert were cousins, and about the only example in the long line of English monarchs where the marital vows were sacredly observed and sincere affection existed.

Shakespeare loved and wedded a farmer's daughter. She was faithful to her vows, but he could hardly say the same for the great bard himself. Like most of the poets, he showed too little discrimination in bestowing his affection on the other sex.

The liberal party have been in power during two-thirds of this period, and have created 123 peers, as against forty on the part of their opponents, yet they are still in a minority in the House of Lords. It should, however, be explained that although in less than forty years 163 new patents have been issued, the whole of them were not absolute additions to the strength of the peerage. In the majority of instances the dukes have been recruited from the ranks of the marquises, from the vicounts, and the vicounts from the barons. Rare instances occur in which a commoner at once receives an earldom, such as in the case of Lord John Russell. A retiring Speaker of the House of commons generally receives a viscountcy, but as a rule the rank of baron of the United Kingdom is that by which an outsider enters the House of Lords.

The list above given is irrespective of the peers' eldest sons, who have been called to the upper house in the lifetimes of their fathers. The Marquis of Anglesey was called up as Lord Anglesey in 1832, by Earl Grey, the Marquis of Albuquerquy as Lord Bruce, in 1839, by Lord Melbourne, the Earl of Londesborough as Lord Lytton, in 1841 by Sir Robert Peel, the Earl of Derby as Lord Stanley, in 1844, by Sir Robert Peel, Lord Stanley of Alderley, as Lord Eddisbury, in 1848, by Earl Russell, Earl Stratford, as Lord Stratford, in 1853, by the Earl of Aberdeen, the Earl of Tankerville, as Lord Ouseburn, in 1859, by the Earl of Derby, Earl Fortescue, as Lord Fortescue, in 1859, by Viscount Palmerston, and Earl St. Maur, in 1863, as Lord Seymour, also by Lord Palmerston.

The calling up of Lord Stanley by the Earl of Aberdeen was the only patent of peerage conferred by that nobleman during his tenure of office, a period which extended over more than two years. Even his chancellor, Lord Cranworth, had been a member of the upper house two years before his appointment to the woolsack.

St. George—How to Avoid It.—The season when the sun's rays pour down with their greatest intensity, and inflame upon the head of man the dangerous and painful known as coup de soleil, is now at hand, and it is well to remind persons of the fact. Very simple precautions will save persons from being seized by the sunstroke. One of the best remedies is a thin piece of sponge loosely sewed into the top of the hat, and occasionally moistened with water in the course of the day. We have heard of a man who walked twenty miles under a hot sun with a damp pocket handkerchief inside the crown of his hat, and did not suffer any inconvenience. The precautions are so obvious and simple that people do not regard them. Were they complicated and expensive, their use would be more general.

A Dutchman was relating his marvellous escape from drowning when thirteen of his companions were lost by the upsetting of a boat, and he alone was saved. "And how did you escape your fate," asked one of his hearers. "I did not go in to save," was the Dutchman's placid answer.
