ENGLISH ROOFING FELT

It is found to hold well in all climates, being
extensively used for Roofing Houses, Out-Build-
ings and Sheds, for Laying Flat Roofs, Gut-
ters, Linings, Chimneys, Storehouses, or Walls,
(both outside and inside), and for placing un-
der Slate or Tiles. It is also a cheap and ef-
fective coating on the underneath side of raft-
ers of a Slat or Tiled Roof, and as a Ceiling
to Iron Roofs, covering Heat, Frost, and Con-
densation of Moisture.

The English Felt is put up in rolls of 25
yards in length, by 32 inches in width,
and containing a surface of 100 square feet.

It is to be laid across the roof, shingle-fashion,
with a top of two inches and secured by
nailing the edges with 3d nails and tin caps.

When laid, the Felt is to be painted with
Water Proof Cement, and Sanded. The Water
Proof Cement is sold ready for use, and is
applied with a brush.

TARRED ROOFING FELT.
Used extensively for Sheathing Houses, and for
Flat and Gable Roofing, also for placing un-
der Slate, Tin and Shingle roofing.

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
